Greatest Blockade in the History of the G. T. R. Yards Filled From the Coves To East London

The need of a larger Grand Trunk yard in this city, was probably never more strikingly in evidence than late on Saturday night, when nearly a dozen freight trains from the west were stalled and blocked the local yards for several hours.

The blockade was one of the worst that has ever occurred and the trains extended in regular order from the yards in the east end nearly to the Cove bridge.

After considerable delay, in which the crossings from Wellington to Adelaide street were blocked for many minutes, it was decided to cut some of the trains.

This was done, and the roadways were cleared again, although in many instances the strings of cars were left so as to block the sidewalks and belated passersby had to walk out into the middle of the road, in the deep snow, and then walk back again to the sidewalk.

With the thermometer down to 20 below the delay was a most unpleasant one for the brakemen who had to run the cars, climb down and uncouple, and then a few hours after climb cut of their warm caboeses and couple the trains together again.

It was fortunate that the through early morning expresses were all late, or they would have been detained for no little time, as the jam of freight cars was not moved until nearly six o'clock in the morning.
