# PTE. W. A. PARSONS KILLED IN ACTION

More Casualties Added to London's Long List.

Word was received today by F. Parsons, 72 Rectory street, of the death of his son in action, Pte. W. A. Parsons. Pte. Parsons left the city as a sergeant of the Army Medical Corps, and upon his arrival in England reverted to the rank of private in order to get to France, and was transferred to the 50th Battalion. He has been in France since last Christmas. Prior to enlistment, Pte. Parsons was employed in the local offices of the Dominion Express Company.

**Signalier Wounded.**  
George Huddleston, 740 Dundas street, has received official word that Signalier Arthur James Huddleston, infantry, has been wounded in the left thigh and was admitted to No. 9 General Hospital at Rouen on August 10.

**His Second Wound.**  
Corp. R. Fulton has been wounded for the second time, says an official message to his mother, Mrs. Fulton, 12 Sycamore street, the time by gunshot in the finger. His first wound was received at Passchendaele on November 9, 1917, this being his only absence from the trenches in two years. His brother, Sapper David Fulton, has recently gone overseas, and another brother, Lance-Corp. W. Fulton, having returned from the front, was wounded in three years' service.

# JOKER IN INSURANCE

POLICIES WILL COST CITY \$10,000 YEARLY

Serious Problem To Face Over Soldiers' Insurance.

City Treasurer Bell has discovered where the city is to be mulcted to the tune of about \$10,000 yearly in connection with the soldiers' insurance. The policy of allowing the different insurance policies to lapse into extended insurance after the fourth year is now in force. Many policies are now under this clause. However, the policies of some companies provide for but three or four years' extended policy. One company's term runs as high as ten or twelve years, however, and while probing into this Mr. Bell found that the company demands that on each policy the war risk be paid while the soldier remained overseas. There are many soldiers insured in this company.

# LONDON MUST MANAGE WITH 17,793 TONS ANTHRACITE LESS THAN IT GOT IN 1917-1918

It Will, However, Get More Bituminous and Can Obtain a Steam Anthracite Which Is Good in Some Circumstances.

Fuel Controller McCallum has received a letter of advice from Ontario's fuel controller, R. C. Harris, Toronto, in regard to the distribution of fuel in London for the coming winter. The letter stated that London's allotment of anthracite coal for the coming winter is 100,000 tons. In 1917-18, 108,896 tons were received, and last winter 117,557 tons were unloaded. The letter stated that London will have to get along with 17,793 tons less than last winter, and 8,565 less than the winter before.

**Urges Use of Wood.**  
The fuel controller lays emphasis on one fact in his letter to Mr. McCallum, and also in letters to the twenty-six coal dealers of the city, which is to the effect that people who have wood should use it. He says that wood should not be allowed to go to waste. There is no justification under the war conditions for a dealer to supply coal where wood is on hand, he states.

**Teachers Won't Answer Queries Sent by Board**  
Say No Reply Is Possible at the Present Time.

OFFICIAL MAKES THREAT Says Some of Those Concerned May Lose Their Certificates.

The five women teachers of the school board asked by the teachers' committee of the board to declare their position in regard to the open defiance of the board by the Women's Teachers' Guild, have refused to answer the question put to them by the committee.

The committee this morning and opened the letters. They were all the same. There were not more than a half-dozen words difference in the whole five. Some of them were four pages long and the others seven, depending on the writing of each teacher.

The whole gist of the letter was contained in the final part of the last paragraph of each.

I wish to submit with every defence that the question is one which at present does not permit of an answer.

The committee's consideration of the letters was short. It decided that it would refer the whole matter to the board with the recommendation that the matter be referred to Dr. Waugh, chief inspector of the public and separate schools of the province.

"Some of these teachers may lose their certificates," said an official of the board in discussing the matter this morning.

The letters of the teachers were pointed out. They reviewed the whole situation, and the little notes of comment inserted are pointed.

The request of the committee as presented to the five teachers was that they should correct what the committee termed misleading statements made to the woman's council.
