CORNER STONE IS LAID OF ST. JAMES' CHURCH City Dock Formally Opened—New Service to Lewiston—Man Injured.

HAMILTON, Aug. 20.—(Special).—The corner stone of St. James Presbyterian Church, corner of Locke and Herkimer-streets, was laid this evening by Rev. Dr. Fletcher. The pastor, Rev. Thos. MacLachlan, presented a handsome trowel to him. Addresses were given by the following: Rev. A. McLaren, Rev. D. Trayner, Geo. H. Milne, Rev. Roy Yanwick, Geo. Black, Geo. Rutherford, Rev. B. Kitchin, J. D. Graham, A. M. Cunningham and Geo. A. Young.

The city dock was formally declared open this afternoon by Ald. McLaren, who spoke in appreciation of ex-Ald. J. Eastwood's good work in this connection. It is said that the Mutual Steamship Co., which has rented the dock and which is outside of the merger, will institute a passenger service between Hamilton, Charlotte and Lewiston.

SQUAD OF HIGHLANDERS OFF TO ALDERSHOT

Regiment and Friends Give Them a Great Send-Off—Will Be Gone Two Months.

It was a great send off that was given the party of the 48th Highlanders who left the union station this morning for Aldershot on the aviation of their linked regiment, the "Fighting Gordons."

Those who went were: Lieut.-Col. Donald M. Robertson, Capt. J. E. K. Osborne, Lieut. Archie R. McGregor, Col.-Serjeant W. H. Grant and Ptes. W. Bell, L. A. Elliott, Alexander Simpson, E. Johnson, Alexander Ross, and J. Glover.

About 200 men of the regiment were at the station with the pipes and drum in white tunics, and all the officers, Col. Davidson, Col. Macdonald, Col. Goodenham, J. M. Alexander, J. A. Macdonald and J. J. McLennan were present as well as Major Michie, Major Currie, Major Donald, Capt. Sattor, Capt. Darling, and the Lieutenants.

At the armories General Gordon inspected the contingent and said good-bye to Col. Robertson. The escort with the pipes then marched to the station to the music of "The Cock of the North," and the champion of all Highland marches, "Will Mackay's Farewell."

At the station a great crowd had gathered and there was much cheering and the most cordial feeling. Many friends of the soldiers made their last farewells on the train which did not leave till 10.20 and choral parties sang appropriate ditties.

Jessie Brown at Lucknow, and marched up and down the platform to the rousing strains of "McKay's Farewell to Edinburgh." Loud cheers followed the receding carriages and the party went back to the armories once more to the tune of "The Cock of the North."

B. Watt told that the day's run up to noon on Monday was 659 knots, an hourly average of 25.66 knots. This beats the best former record, her own, made on July 6 of 643 knots.

HIS EXCELLENCY ON TOUR SPENDS DAY AT LAMBTON

Earl Grey Taking a Holiday Jaunt Along the Lakes—No Definite Program.

His excellency the governor-general was in town yesterday. Early in the morning the trim little government yacht Speedy steamed into Toronto Bay and anchored at George Somerville's City Wharf at the foot of York-street.

His excellency is accompanied by his private secretary, Arthur Shaden, and Lord Lascelles, with whom he went up to the Lambton golf links and partook of luncheon, after which a game was played on the links.

The trip, which is of a most hazy nature, is being taken by the earl more with a view of seeing the grain traffic in full operation and for an inspection of the situation on the Great Lakes than anything else.

Last night an informal private dinner party was given on board the yacht to some of Earl Grey's Toronto friends. Among those present were D. D. Mann and Col. G. T. Denison.

The Speedy left some time last night, but the next stopping place was not divulged, as no definite program has been arranged and the destination will be just where Earl Grey happens to want it to be.

During the trip his excellency will make no public appearances nor accept civic addresses.

KEIR HARDIE'S VISIT IS TO UNITE PARTIES

Working Arrangement in Politics Between Labor, etc., and Socialists May be Achieved.

The Toronto District Trades and Labor Council last night decided to entertain Keir Hardie, M.P., and family as its guests while in Toronto. The distinguished British politician is expected here on Aug. 31 and will remain here for about four days.

The political element in labor circles expect that he will succeed in securing a working arrangement between the Independent Labor Party and the Socialists similar to that in England. The Dominion Trades Congress at Halifax is considered likely to take a day off to enable the Socialist and Labor party delegates to confer on this policy with Keir Hardie. It is expected that the labor party except in the Dominion elections, especially in British Columbia, will support a substantial increase in their vote in the Dominion elections.
