TARIFF DIDN'T ASSIST **COTTON TRADE TROUBLES**

So Reports W. L. M. King-Suggests Plans for Promoting Peace Between Labor and Capital.

The ten per cent. reduction in wages, which occasioned the strike and lock-out in May, was not due to any peculiar severity on the part of the Canadian employers or to tariff, or other special conditions, but was an economic consequence of general trade and financial depression, which Canada shared in common with the United. 


