Mr. Doherty explains that some months ago when the postoffice department laid the claims of the carriers before the treasury board, that body did not see its way to grant the increase demanded, and, that in view of the fact that parliament approved of the \$100 bonus submitted by the committee on sup-plementary estimates, it is impossible for the postoffice department or the governor-in-council to add to the allowance provided. In conclusion the acting postmaster-general states that the \$100 bonus was not granted with the intention of fully covering the in-creased cost of lving, but as a help to that end.
