HOW TO PLAY GOLF

We have all heard it said that the successful shot is made, not by the club, but by the mind. This statement has a large merit. The player who really good player with a poor club usually can achieve better shots than a poor player with a good club, but when the players are equally matched good performance will be found on the side of the good player with the good clubs.
