POLICE COURT

Jewish Junk Dealer Fined \$40 for Buying Junk From Boys.

Because he bought junk from minors, Joseph Budawitch, a Jew, was this morning fined \$40, or one month in jail. The case, which was taken up the latter part of last week, was concluded this morning, with the result as stated. Several witnesses were examined, among them little Willie Maloney, who with thirteen-year-old John Nickerson, was brought into court from the jail. Maloney's evidence pointed strongly against the defendant, whom the youthful witness positively identified as the man to whom he had sold the brass which was taken from Hilyard's mill, and for which he declared Budawitch had paid him five cents on Sunday, April 26th. He had divided up with Nickerson, his companion—who with him is held for theft—each having taken two cents and a piece of candy.

It was also shown in the evidence that the stolen brass was taken from a machine belonging to Mr. Hilyard, thereby damaging the piece of mechanism to the extent of \$25. Meyer Budawitch, a son of the defendant, on hearing the judgment of the court, handed the police clerk a cheque to cover the fine, but later caused some comment when he demanded its return, saying if the city wanted his father they could take him, for he could not afford to pay \$40, or even \$20, for his paternal relative's release, and the poor old man was let go into jail.

The defendant's evidence was taken through an interpreter. Frank McAnulty was fined \$4, or ten days, for drunkenness, and Joseph McQuada and William Johnson were each fined \$8, or two months each, for similar offences. Joseph McAnulty was fined \$8, or two months in jail, for drunkenness, \$16, or two months, for violently resisting the police, and a charge of being a habitual frequenter of houses of ill-repute was allowed to stand against him.
