Continued Russian success and operations on a larger scale in the Balkans are the features of last night's news. Doctor Tells How To Strengthen Eyesight 50 per cent In One Week's Time In Many Instances

The new school building on Bentley street and Douglas avenue was the chief topic at a meeting of the school board last evening. The proposed new school building, according to plans submitted, will have a frontage of 97 feet and a depth of 85 feet, except for rear projection of the assembly hall, which will make a depth of 90 feet. Rooms will all be 27 x 82 x 12 with light coming from left side only. Plumbing will be of the most improved and modern type, and the heating system of hot water, electric lights and possibly tubes for vacuum cleaning. Two plans were submitted one with eight rooms and assembly hall. The matter of exact location was not settled last night.

Written reports from a boiler inspector stated that the Winter street school boiler leaked and was cracked, and that the grate was in poor condition. The boiler in the Centennial school also needed slight repairs and the inspector also suggested that the pipes be covered with asbestos. The matter was referred to the building committee and visitors.
