KING GEORGE AND QUEEN RECEIVED BY POPE PIUS

Audience of Nearly a Half Hour With Head of Catholic Church.

Ceremonious Reception of Sovereigns at Vatican—Received in Private Library—Call on Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, Follows.

Rome, May 8.—Pope Pius received King George and Queen Mary in solemn audience in the apostolic palace of the Vatican at 11 a.m. Their Majesties were accompanied by the Hon. Theophilus Russell, British minister to the Holy See, and by their suite. They dined in the Vatican through the Gate of St. Peter and upon arriving in the courtyard of St. Damaso, were accorded military honors by the Italian Guards and a detachment of Pontifical gen darmes. Prince Russell, grand master of the Holy See, in his picturesque costume of black velvet and buff, opened the door of the machine bearing the King and Queen and as the sovereigns stepped forth they were welcomed in the name of the Pontiff by Mr. De Sampaio, papal major domo. The royal cortege, comprising high prelates and prominent personages of the papal court, then formed an escorting their Majesties up the staircase into the Clementine Hall. King George was in full dress uniform, Queen Mary wore the customary black dress and veil.

KRUPP DIRECTORS FINED AND GET LONG SENTENCES

Penalties Total Imprisonment Aggregating Fifty-five Years, With Fines Amounting to 850,000 Marks—Verdict Received Quietly.

Werdn, Germany, May 8.—Dr. Krupp Von Bohlen, head of the Krupp Works, and his three directors, Brubner, Osterlen and Hartwig heard their sentences in the Werder court today. The penalties totalled imprisonment aggregating 55 years, the French court martial having convicted them of responsibility for the conflicts between the Krupp workmen and a French squad of soldiers on March 31 last which resulted in the death of fourteen workmen.

Cat Mothers Foxes

Port Arthur, Ont., May 8.—Three young foxes, valued at several hundred dollars, which were slowly starved to death on a fox farm at Mill Port, 48 of the Port Arthur and Duluth Railway, have been nearly restored to full health and strength by the ministrations of a common female house cat.

Maritime M.P.'s to Get Together to Press For Rights of This Section

New Brunswick Members, Liberal and Conservative, Had Meeting Last Night With Moncton Delegation.

Ottawa, May 8.—All the New Brunswick members of the House of Commons, Liberals and Conservatives, met in the office of Hon. A. B. Copp, Secretary of State last evening a deputation from Moncton, N. B., consisting of W. E. McMonagle, George C. Bogan and L. J. Doucet, to discuss the question of forming some kind of maritime union which could present with unity and force the representations of the eastern provinces on the subject of freight rates and other economic subjects of vital importance.

After a full and free discussion it was decided to call a meeting of members not only from New Brunswick but also from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island to go into the matter.

There is some talk to the effect that the Conservatives of New Brunswick are seeking to take advantage of their numerical superiority in putting forward the demands of the maritimers. It is understood that the blame did not all lie with the Liberal Government and it was also pointed out today that the Liberal Government is pledged to keep the Canadian National Railways out of politics and give a fair trade from all interference. It is believed, however, that some real assistance can be obtained for the maritimers when and if their representations can be raised above the level of party lines.

DR. TIKHON DOES NOT RECOGNIZE RUSSIAN BISHOPS

Notified That He Has Been Unfrocked by a Church Conclave, Former Patriarch Refuses Compliance.

Moscow, May 9.—When notified yesterday by a committee headed by Metropolitan Peter that he had been unfrocked by a decision of the church conclave, Dr. Tikhon, former patriarch of all Russia, flatly refused to remove his priestly robes.

Who are these strange bishops? he asked. "Their names are unknown to me. Who decided that I am no longer a clergyman?"

The committee went to Donosty Monastery, to which the former patriarch had been removed from prison, late last night.

Vancouver, B. C., May 9.—In the police court yesterday three publications were fined \$25 each on being found guilty of keeping gaming houses. The case pointed out that until the ruling was reversed by a higher court, the operating of such competitions would remain illegal, and it was proposed to proceed at once against any further violations.

CANADIAN IN BANDITS' HANDS IN NEW OUTRAGE
