

### CASE OF JUDGE LANDRY AGAINST A LAND COMPANY

**Matter Before Judge McLeod Today—Several Estates in Probate**

In the case of Judge P. A. Landry vs. The New Brunswick Alberta Land Company, Limited, with head office in Dorchester, N. B., hearing was had, Law morning before Mr. Justice McLeod on motion of M. G. Teed, K. C., for the plaintiff to continue an injunction restraining the defendants from selling certain shares of their capital stock, to which the plaintiff says he is entitled. It was contended that the plaintiff had secured an option on sixty-seven shares of stock and that injunction was to restrain the company from allotting or disposing of these shares in any way; also to restrain them from declining any dividend on their stock except on the basis of the sixty-seven shares claimed being considered the same as the rest of the stock issued by the company. The said stock being provided for in the treasury. James Friel of Dorchester opposed the motion and affidavits were read on both sides. His Honor ordered that the injunction be continued. Hearing in the suit to have those shares declared to be the property of the plaintiff and issued accordingly will take place on May 23.

**County Court Chambers.**  
Judge Forbes gave judgment for the plaintiff this morning in the case of Sieves vs. Lynch. This case was partly tried a few days ago and the attorneys agreed upon a settlement whereby the plaintiff was to receive \$185 in settlement of the claim. This amount was to be paid within a given period. The time having expired and the amount not being paid, judgment was this morning entered for the full amount of the claim, \$217, and costs. G. H. Yelver was the plaintiff's solicitor and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., was solicitor for the defendant.

**Probate.**  
In the probate court today in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Elizabeth H. Macaulay, there was return of a citation to pass the accounts of Alexander L. Levy, the administrator, and for order of distribution. The accounts were proved as filed but it appeared that there was insufficient to pay the creditors and the estate was therefore ordered to be divided among those who have proved their claims. Inches & Hazen are probators.

In the matter of the estate of Miss Jane Smith, there came up the application of Bertha McAllan, whose maiden name was Speight, for order of payment of a small sum of money, which had been held in the hands of the receiver general pending her coming of age. The petitioner now coming of age evidence was taken on the fact and the amount of the money and payment of the amount. Charles F. Sanford is probator.

In the matter of Miss Elizabeth Bourke of Lancaster was proved. She gives to Harry G. Smith of West St. John her leasehold property, a portion of the western half of Lot No. 284 in Guilford street, in trust for his son, Frank Benjamin Sydney Smith, until he shall come of age, and then to convey the same to him. She directs that her executor shall provide for her mother, her mother, Mary Bourke; her father, John Bourke, and herself, and to erect a suitable funeral home in the old Catholic burying ground in Lancaster, where they are and where she desires to be buried; the rest of her estate she gives to Ruth Catherine Smith and Madeline Louise Smith, share and share alike, and she appoints Harry G. Smith to be executor. He was sworn in as such. There is no real estate; personal estate, including the household, \$1,700. Inches & Hazen are probators.

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### THE POTATO MARKET

**St. John Merchant's Summary of Conditions After North Shore Trip**

Timothy Collins returned last evening after a trip to the North Shore of the province. Speaking of conditions there he said today that farmers were suffering severe losses because of the failure of the potato market, and there was thousands of barrels left unsold with little prospect of their being disposed of. The market in Upper Canada had fallen flat and it seemed impossible to get rid of their holdings at almost any price. Many of them were talking of buying pigs and using the potatoes for feeding purposes, but the market in hogs was also very firm and with little tendency to be easier.

The extraordinary large crop of potatoes last year over-stocked the market and the demand was slim. Local dealers are very well supplied. Through-out the province the conditions were about the same, for in Carleton county the potatoes were selling at low quotations as well.

### THE ST. JOHN FIGHT AGAINST WHITE PLAGUE

The monthly meeting of the executive of the Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis was held in the dispensary rooms yesterday afternoon. Mr. Justice McKeown in the chair. 
