

RUMANIA WILL QUIT BUSINESS WITH GERMANY

Takes Drastic Step of Re-
praisal in Reparations
Dispute

THINK COMMUNISM
IS BEHIND TROUBLE

Believe Political Differences
to be Parly Responsible
for Controversy.

BERLIN, Feb. 19.—The Rumanian government has ordered its officials to discontinue all negotiations and business relations with German citizens and officers as the latest drastic step of reprisal in the Rumanian-German reparations dispute, according to reports from Budapest. This report, apparently authoritative, following close on the heels of one stating that Germans were being brutally ejected from Rumania, has caused an even more tense situation here. Germans were dragged from their beds without warning in the middle of the night, and, half clothed, across the border, reports from Hungary stated.

Political Disputes.

While the reparations dispute is thought to be the principal cause for the expulsion of Germans, reports stated that much of the trouble was due to political differences. Communism was reported as being partly responsible for the controversy.

FEARED HOLD-UP; WALKED INTO ONE

Jeweler Ordered to Throw up
Hands and Loses \$5,000
Stock.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—When Louis Reich bought a jewelry store in the Bronx, a year ago, from Mrs. Bernard B. Brown he knew that Mrs. Brown was a widow and that the shop was purchasable only because her husband just a month before had ignored a command by robbers to open his safe and had fought them. Reich decided then that if ever he were in a similar position he would not resist.

So when he found a man covering him with a pistol as he came from a rear room into the store, he threw up his hands at once and turned to the wall when told to do so. Two other men then entered the store and took \$5,000 worth of jewelry from the safe. When leaving one of the robbers told Reich not to move, and he obeyed. Only when he heard the door opened again and his name called did he turn around. It was his wife.

In the hold-up in which Brown was killed nothing was stolen, the bandits running away after one of them had shot the jeweler.

GETS \$1,200 GOODS IN STORE BREAK

Man Arrested in Edmonton
Robbery Later Allowed
to go.

EDMUNDSTON, N. B., Feb. 18.—A burglary was committed last night in the jewelry store of E. J. Albert, the thief getting between \$1,000 and \$1,200 worth of jewelry.

An out of town man was arrested and searched this morning but nothing of an incriminating nature was found on him and he was let go.

The robbery was discovered about 7 o'clock this morning when people were going to work.

forthcoming trip which will likely be

N. B. GOT \$1,163,845 FEDERAL ROAD AID

Doucet Asks About Importation
of U. S. Potatoes Into
Canada.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Questions of
interest to the Maritime Provinces were
answered in the House of Commons
this afternoon. In reply to A. J. Dou-
cet, Conservative, Kent, it was stated
that in the calendar year of 1924, 66-
875,178 pounds of potatoes were im-
ported from the United States for con-
sumption in Canada, and in 1925, up
to Feb. 10, the quantity was 3,015,742
pounds.

Since the beginning of the fiscal year
1921-22, a total of \$1,163,845 has been
paid by the Federal Government to the
Province of New Brunswick under the
Canada Highway Act, of which \$488-
808.74 was paid in the fiscal year
1921-22; \$871,978.00 in the year 1922-23;
\$207,202.60 in 1923-24, and \$56,855.55 so
far in the fiscal year 1924-25.

In reply to a question by E. W.
Robinson, Hon. W. R. Motherwell,
Minister of Agriculture, stated that the
introduction of a bill providing for the
control of the composition, manufac-
ture and sale of insecticides and fun-
gicides is now under consideration by
the Federal Government.
