

TELEPHONES TO BE MADE WIRELESS RECEIVERS
Everett, Wash., Sept. 1.—Telephones in Everett, already equipped with a device which measures conversation, are to be made into wireless receiving stations through the use of an attachment supplied by the Puget Sound Co., an independent corporation, which serves this city.

To hear concerts, new bulletins and other features through the air by broadcasting stations of Seattle, thirty miles from here, Everett radio fans, who also are telephone subscribers, will simply hook their radio receiving sets onto the attachment, which is known as the radio adapter, and which will fit into the telephone bell box. Expensive aerials and wiring will not be needed.

In addition to supplying the adapter, the telephone company, working with the Seattle Radio Association, will mail to its radio subscribers weekly programmes of the broadcasting stations and will collect \$5 a year from each fan to defray the cost. The Seattle association hopes to have telephones in all other cities within a radius of 100 miles, equipped with the adapter.

The conversation-measuring device, which, it is said, is not used anywhere else in the world, has been operated here for eight months, and enables the company to charge for the telephone service, according to the length of the conversations.

When many residents found that the device, called the telephometer, increased their monthly bills, they protested to the State Department of Public Works, which is to hold a hearing September 6, to decide whether the affair must be abandoned. In the meantime 629 Everett residents have signed applications for new telephones to be installed if the machine is given up.

Friends of the telephometer say that some of the opposition was caused by the fact that it made "listening-in" on party lines cost just so much for every

CANT RETRIEVE LIQUOR.
Master of Federal Court Decides Against Boston Men.
Boston, Sept. 1.—The \$250,000 stock of pre-prohibition liquors seized from Cornelius and Dennis J. Keefe by prohibition agents several months ago may not be returned to the owners, according to a report by Arthur D. Hill, the master appearing by Federal Judge Morton to hear evidence of their petition to recover the liquor. The master found that the Keefe cellar was used for purposes other than that of a private cellar. The seizure was said to be the largest ever made in New England by prohibition officers, and the stock consisted of large quantities of champagnes, wines, brandies, and whiskies.

LADY RHONDA ON THE SEX QUALIFICATION ACT
New York, Aug. 31.—Lady Rhonda, who is residing at Stoughton, Conn., before renewing her fight for a seat in the House of Lords, declared in an interview with a representative of the National Women's Party that in October her committee of women "propose to tell Lloyd George exactly where the sex qualifications act has failed, and ask him what he means to do about it."

"We now say the sex qualification act is a dud act," she said. "A few weeks ago the six point group, largely composed of the militant group, demanded that Lloyd George receive a deputation of women who were to ask him what he proposed to do about securing full equality for women. Lloyd George has announced that he will see us in October. Thirty or forty large organ-

BELGIUM'S PLAN OF REPARATIONS PAYMENT PASSED

Agreement Reached by Commission—Temporary Respite for Germany.

Paris, Aug. 31.—The reparations commission late today unanimously accepted the Belgian compromise on the German moratorium proposition.

M. Dubois, the French member of the commission, voted with his colleagues after a long interview between sessions with Premier Poincare.

The reparations commission has relieved Germany of the necessity of making any further cash payments in reparations for the remainder of 1922, but defers its decision on the question of a moratorium until radical reforms in Germany's finance are carried out. These include the balancing of her budget, reduction of the new government to remove all existing inequalities of the law as between men and women. After election, she said, the sex disqualification act was tremendously heralded but subsequent events undeceived the women who thought it meant full equality. Interpretation of the act in her case holding that it did not give Lady Rhonda the right to go with the peers, was, she declared, a final blow.
