CROSS-EXAMINED BY THE PROSECUTOR

Q. Coulombe, you were to report back at 2130 hours on the 13th day of June, 1945, to A.15 C.I.T.C., Shilo. Is that correct?

Yes, sir.

Q. You did not report back?

No, sir.

Q. You were not granted any leave were you?

No, sir.

Q. You remained absent until you surrendered in civilian clothes at Cornwall, Ontario?

Yes, sir.

Q. At 2300 hours on the 6th of September, 1945. Is that correct?

Yes, sir.

Q. At that time you were dressed in civilian clothes?

Yes, sir.

Q. You were subsequently brought back under escort to Kingston, is that correct?

Yes, sir.

Q. Where was your home at the time you joined up this last time?

Cornwall, Ontario.

Q. Is that the address which is shown on your Army documents?

We have two addresses. The mail goes to 55 Pitt Street, which is a butcher shop, but the private house is West Front which no mail is delivered.

Q. Is that right in Cornwall?

Right in Cornwall, sir.

Q. Where did you go when you went on leave in June?

I stayed right at home in Cornwall.

Q. And after the 13th of June where did you go?
