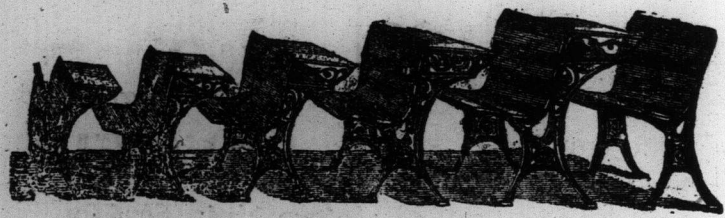

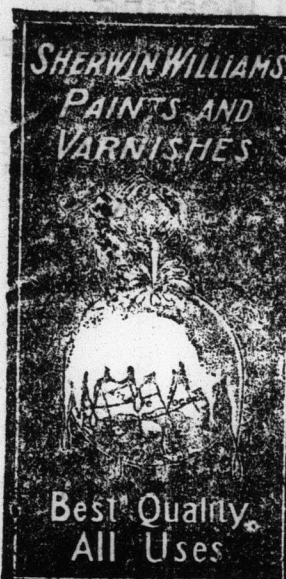

Missionary Meeting at St. Matthew's

The annual meeting of the C. of E. Missionary Society was held in St. Matthew's Church on Monday evening, Nov. 23rd, when an interested audience gathered to hear those who were chosen to speak on that occasion. Those who were present were not disappointed but were fired with greater zeal than ever before to labor for the cause of missions in the foreign fields. The first speaker was the Rev. Mr. Caldwell, of Briggs. He took for his subject: 'Japan, its people, its customs, its trade, its religion, and the work the Christian Missionary has to do in the land of the Rising Sun.' The second speaker was the Rev. C. W. Holland, of Carleton Place. Mr. Holland took for his subject: 'Intercession.' He went on to show how in this, the greatest war this world has ever seen, money was a factor we could not possibly do without. Men were the all-important factor. Men willing to lay down their lives if used for the cause of the Empire, for King and Country. But greatest of all was Intercession, the power of Prayer. Prayer to the One who overrules all the powers of this world. We need to pray in such a crisis as this and also to pray for the Missionary Cause. A great many of our students who were studying for the Mission Field have heard their Country's call and have gone to the front. Some of them will never return.

Then it is our duty to 'Pray to the Lord of the Harvest that He may send forth more laborers into his vineyard.' To raise up young men and women to fill the places of those who have answered their Country's call and laid down their lives for the cause of Right.

Rev. Canon Bolt was the next speaker. His subject was: 'This War, a challenge to Christianity.' He referred to Germany as a nation of Culture, Science, Religion, But what kind of Religion? A Religion that has for its motto, 'Might is Right.' A Religion that heeds not the cries of innocent women, little children and heavy hearts, that lays waste and destroys homes and beautiful land which was part of God's great universe.

Is this the Religion we are to carry to the heathen who knows not God. Better by far to let them worship their gods of wood and stone than to burden them with such a Religion. The Religion of Jesus Christ that he gave to his disciples when he sent them forth saying 'Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel,' that is the Religion we want to send to China, Japan and all the nations that have not yet heard the Gospel message.

Supreme Court on Circuit

(Standard, Nov. 28.)

The Supreme Court on Circuit opened here on Tuesday last at 11 o'clock, the Hon. Mr. Justice Johnson presiding.

There were some few civil cases for hearing, but nearly all were settled between the parties before the Court again met.

W. Carson vs. Willie Davis. Action for \$300 as wages. This case was partly heard, but was settled between the parties before the Court again met.

A. W. Hierlihy vs. Jennima Gossage. Contempt. The plaintiff, a deputy sheriff, alleged that he had been assaulted and obstructed while in the discharge of his duty. The defendant was acquitted. Mr. Hunt for plaintiff, Mr. McNeilly for defendant.

A Grand Jury was summoned and attended Court, where they

were addressed at some length by His Lordship. The Jury were Hugh Cameron (foreman), James Pesch, John Rorke, James Cron, James Garland, Stephen Pike, Frank McRae, W. J. James, J. Thomey (A.), A. Howell, L. Whitman, J. LeDrew, George Soper.

His Lordship, in his address to the Jury referred to the orderly condition of the town and District, the absence of any crime, the rights and privileges of Grand Jurors, and spoke extensively on the war now going on. He also requested the Jury to visit the Gaol and Premises and to report on them.

On Thursday the Grand Jury handed in a presentment in which His Lordship was thanked for his able address on the opening day. The Jury had visited the gaol and premises, and stated they had found all in a satisfactory condition.

Newfoundlanders Arrive

The Newfoundland contingent has now joined the Canadians on Salisbury Plain, and is encamped in an area which has been named after the gallant little Colony from which it has come. It was originally intended to send 500 men as a first contingent, but recruiting was so brisk that it was possible to increase this number, and more will be forthcoming if they are needed.

In addition about 100 members of the Newfoundland Naval Reserve are serving in the Canadian cruiser Niobe, which, besides performing convoy duties, has been assisting the vessels of the Royal Navy in their search for the elusive German cruisers in the Atlantic.

Newfoundland's population is only a quarter of a million, nearly all engaged in the fisheries which form the staple industry of the island, and the community is not a wealthy one. The equipping and maintaining of a regiment for service in Europe are, therefore, a striking proof of the enthusiasm of the islanders for the Allied cause.

Italy's Attitude

New National Organ Urges Government to Enter War.

Rome, Oct. 31.—The Idea Nazionale, the new organ of the Nationalist party, which has always urged the participation of Italy in the European conflict, says that Italian inaction, after the attitude of Turkey, would be simply absurd blindness.

The Turkish intervention, it declares, brings forward the question of the partition of Asia Minor or a definite solution of the Oriental question which has influenced Mediterranean policy for over a century.

Furthermore, Turkish action against Egypt will threaten also Libya, Italian Somaliland and Erythraea, and therefore it is necessary to act.

For Italy, the paper continues, 'it is now no more a question of the European conflict, but a conflict eminently Mediterranean. It is no more a question of solving the Adriatic problem but the Mediterranean problem, which comprises the whole national existence.'

An Atrocious Assault

(Harbor Grace Standard.)

An atrocious assault on a little girl of very tender years—not yet five—took place here this week. It appears that a man named William Bransfield, lately returned from Labrador, and somewhat it is said under the influence of strong drink, met on Thursday afternoon two little girls on Harvey Street, near the Death Hill Coopersage, and asked them to come up the hill with him to get a cent to buy some apples. One refused, saying she was not allowed to do so. The other child, with all the innocence and confidence of childhood, went with him. When this became known and the little one did not return a search was immediately made by her father and friends, and she was found about 6.30 o'clock in a barn on the Look-out lately used as a day shelter for sheep. The man received some rough handling from the angry and horrified search-party, which in a less law-abiding community would have meant the application of that rough but generally mistakingly used justice known as Lynch law. The offender was taken to jail, indicted, and on pleading guilty, sentenced by Mr. Justice Johnson to five years' imprisonment in the Penitentiary with hard labor, which His Lordship considered after deliberation on all the circumstances met the ends of justice, and which it is hoped will prove to be adequate as a deterrent and reformatory for an offence which in the eyes of many is more to be dreaded than death itself. The prisoner is 34 years of age, not a native of the town but has resided here a number of years.

Lobster Industry

Germany being Largest Customer, Trade Hard Hit

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 23.—The canned lobster industry of Newfoundland and Canada has been hard hit by the European war. As Germany is the largest consumer of this product, the principal market has been cut off. A case of forty-eight tins, which brought \$24 in Newfoundland before the war, now cannot be sold for more than eight or ten dollars. As one merchant put it:

Canned lobsters are as great a drag on the market in Canada and Newfoundland as bales of cotton in the United States.

Ordinarily the returns from the industry amount to about \$3,000,000 a year in Canada and half a million dollars in this colony.

Many of those interested favor the enforcing of a close season on lobsters during the whole of next year, thus taking advantage of the opportunity to replenish the fisheries, which have been greatly depleted by extravagant methods of lobster taking.

Public Notice

Pulp-Wood.

Licenses to cut Pulp Wood on Crown Lands on the Labrador may be issued by His Excellency the Governor in Council, subject to the following conditions:

1. The license shall continue in force until June 30, 1915, and no longer; Provided that any Licensee shall have the right to export any pulp wood so cut at any time up to and including December 31st, 1915.

2. The Licensee shall pay an export on any pulp wood exported of \$1.00 per cord.

3. The Governor in Council may prescribe the rate of wages to be paid men employed by the Licensee for the purpose of cutting and exporting such pulp wood.

4. The export duty is to be paid at the Port of entry when wood is exported.

Any person exporting Pulp Wood without a License, shall be liable to a fine of \$5,000.00 and an amount equal to double the amount of duty on the quantity so exported.

PIT PROPS

Any person may export by the usual export entry any timber or lumber for pit props to any place in the United Kingdom for one year from 1st September, 1914.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPHS

On and after the 26th inst. Telegraph Addresses registered prior to 1st July, 1914, may be used as the Address, but not as the signature in telegrams (a) between any two places in British territory including Egypt, (b) between each and any of the following—British territory including Egypt, territory of allied countries, United States of America, provided in all cases that either Sender or Addressee of both are resident outside Europe. In the case of telegrams emanating from British territory and destined for the territory of an allied power or for the United States of America, the full name and address of the addressee will be given by the sender, but not telegraphed. When the Sender is located at the office of destination he may at his discretion require the office to give the full name and address at which a telegram is to be delivered.
