Resplended With Gems from the Great Poets

War, the thrilling word at the present time, is swaying the hearts of the nations throughout the world. Even in our own Island Home it thrills heart and mind, it trembles on every lip. That one word 'war' means more than pen can ever unravel to the hearts of men; means more than even sympathy can share. He only feels it who can answer prayer.

Therefore, to the God of Peace Newfoundland would raise a prayer for those engaged in the fearful struggle and unending strife. She would pray that the rash, fierce blaze of riot may not last long, but like violent fires soon burn itself out, and in the end that right may triumph and gain the laurel-crown to wear.

Newfoundland has sent forth volunteers to mingle in the great struggle. We believe it will be a comforting thought for our soldiers on the far distant fields to remember that loved ones in the dear old home are sending up to the Throne of Grace petitions for their preservation, and we hope that they on the field 'where mingles war's rattle with groans of the dying' will at times have a practical realization of the Communion of Saints.

Vast and boundless are the claims upon sympathy and prayer in the present unrest and threat of nations for war, for only God alone can command peace to fold her wings in every clime.

Prayer is the friend of the brave. The Motherland across the sea in the past has looked to it for power, and those who fought for her on stormy floods and carnage-covered fields were men eminent for religious devotion, while her adventurers who laid the foundation of her Commerce were the noblest and the best of devotee Christian men.

Many through the power of prayer to-day (although it seems that while men fight upon the earth, fierce fight in upper air) can lift on high their dauntless brows, and spirit-speaking eyes. Can hail in their hearts the triumph yet to come. Can hear Hope's stormy music in the drum. They look forward to the time

When the banner of peace shall again be unfurled;
And shouts of triumph tell from land to land,
That God on high hath raised His mighty hand,
And, from their boasted height of glory, hurled our foes in this dark hour!

England has men today who are willing to write the history of their country in the blood of its foes with the sharp edge of their good broad swords and keep her still The royal throne of kings, the sceptred Isle, the precious stone set in a silver sea.

Her very land is hallowed by the lives and heroic deaths of her departed warriors. Wellington's order, "To guard well her sacred coasts," and Nelson's motto: "England expects every man to do his duty," are inspirations felt upon the battlefield to-day. The Public Building Refused

Since writing the item on the formation of a local volunteer corps and the use of the public building for drill purposes, we learn that the C. L. B. have applied to the Government for the use of the building and have been refused. We hardly think this is fair, especially under present circumstances.

In times of peace there may be some justification in refusing the use of such a building to volunteer corps or brigades, but when the Empire is engaged in a fight for her very life, and is calling upon her sons to help her, the least the authorities can do is to provide our men with every facility for drill.

In other countries engaged in this war hotels and other buildings are being converted into hospitals; then surely we in this country should be given the use of a public building to receive drill instruction at least while the war lasts.

Franconia Coming for Naval Reservists

We hear that the new Cunard liner Franconia will arrive here this week to take to England all the naval reservists on the Calypso which by that time will, it is expected approach 400 men. This fine steamer took the headquarters staff of the Canadian Contingent across the Atlantic last month and is retained for transport work.

Up to noon to day there were on the Calypso some 300 reservists, about twenty coming in from Placentia and vicinity last night. Herald, Nov. 3.

British Ships Defeated (?)

A message from Valparaiso, South America, says that British warships Good Hope, Monmouth, Glasgow and armoured cruiser Otranto were defeated by German squadron of five ships the Monmouth being sunk, Good Hope badly damaged and the other two ships escaped. At this writing this report has not been confirmed, although we may expect to hear something interesting from that quarter soon, as a Japanese squadron of ten ships are reported on their way across the Pacific.
