## A PERSONAL STUDY OF THE KHEDIVÉ.

From the personal as well as the political point of view the Khedive is an interesting study. A man of medium height and solid build, with a handsome, intelligent face, a bright eye, and a manner capable of reserve and vivacity—this is the modern Pharaoh who rules Egypt nominally as the representative of the Sultan and practically as the protégé of Great Britain. Abbas II. is endowed by nature to fit this delicate position. His talents are many and conspicuous. His industry is exemplary, his ambition is tranquil yet indefatigable, and one title of his capacity for affairs would have saved Egypt from the disaster of bankruptcy.

The Khedive has two lives and two characters—one that accords with his instincts and tastes, and another that is decreed by destiny. In the fields and stables of Koubeib he is a country squire, whose pleasure is in crops and horses. No amateur is he, but a serious cultivator and breeder who is his own bailiff and attends to the details of the model village.

An early riser, he is driving over his estate in a dogcart where Cairo is rubbing the sleep out of his eyes. Nothing escapes his vigilance, and many are the stories told of that uncompromising business capacity which has made him the domestic side of his life, for though his official income of five hundred thousand dollars a year.

Abbas II. may not rule Egypt, but he owns and administers a valuable part of it, and as a speculator has proved the soundness of his judgment and the sagacity of his private purse.

In the country his life is marked by a simplicity and regularity almost bucolic. Between five and six he rises for morning prayer; at seven the carriage is ready for the inspection of the gardens and farms; at nine he receives his guests; and at midday he luncheon either with the members of his suite or in the privacy of his harem. The word harem seems out of keeping with the domestic side of his life, for though the Mohammedan religion permits four wives and many concubines, the Khedive—like his father—is content with one wife, who has borne him five charming daughters and a promising son.

### COSMOPOLITAN EDUCATION.

In the Abbas Palace at Cairo lives the Khedive at all seasons. Here, in salons lighted with electricity—in a study with telephone and electric bells and portraits in oil—it is hard to imagine you are in the land of the Pharaohs and that the figure at the desk is one of their successors.

What Pharaoh of them all spoke English and French and German with the representatives of Europe, Turkish with the nominees of the Sultan, Arabic with his subjects, and at night listened with pleasure and understanding to Italian opera. Even this does not exhaust the linguistic attainments of the Khedive nor complete the catalogue of his varied accomplishments.

Abbas II. received a cosmopolitan education, unusual for an Oriental potentate. His father, the enlightened and humane Tewfik, thought of placing his heir at an English public school; but, unfortunately, other counsel prevailed, and at the age of twelve—after a visit to London—Abbas entered the celebrated Haxius School at Geneva, and passed thence to that renowned and aristocratic institution the Theresianum, of Vienna, where grand dukes and princes are taught the elements of knowledge.

At the age of seventeen, on the death of his father, Abbas was summoned to Cairo and invested with the responsibilities of the ruler of Egypt. The stern tutelage of Lord Cromer and the stern tutelage of the "Old Turkish Party"—who tried to jockey the Khedive out of the Sinai peninsula—may be held accountable for two incidents in the young ruler's life. Abbas was determined to challenge the fate of Ishmael. Twelve months after his accession he proclaimed his independence and his administrative justice without regard to wealth or person.

This is a significant confession, and may be accepted as genuine.

His personal relations with the British government are now of the most friendly kind, and in the successor of Lord Cromer he finds a minister in whom he has long had confidence and from whom he entertains a warm appreciation. His recent visit to England—the fourth he has made—will tend to strengthen these friendly associations and to diminish the friction which is unavoidable in an administration under tutelage.—William C. Maxwell.
