PRAIRIE FIRES IN THE WEST

**They Are Working Destruction
On The Canadian Northern
Lines For One Hundred Miles
—Situation Is Serious.**

Winnipeg, May 8.—Prairie fires are working destruction on the line of townships in Northern Manitoba. The North-Western Railway is disturbed by one hundred miles. For two days they have been fanned by a furious wind. The situation continues very serious this morning. The Canadian Northern Company's Telegraph wires are down throughout the menaced district. The fire is spreading rapidly on the C. N. R. left Dauphin this morning for Kelwood where a new fire has broken out. The chief damage is to lumber camps and to the small towns. At Big River, where the C. N. R. has a million dollars invested in lumber and plants grave consequences loom. Throughout the entire district citizens and lumber jacks are fighting the flames.

**SYDNEY MAN SENT UP
FOR TRIAL AT ANCOV**

**Joseph McDonald Arraigned
For Larceny Of Money And
Note—Took Money From
Pocketbook.**

Donald of Sydney, C. B., on being arraigned this afternoon before A. J. Jamer, J. P., charged with the larceny of \$127, and a promissory note valued at \$50 from Fred Rollins Sisson Ridge, pleaded guilty and went up for trial.

TUBERCULOSIS CAMP ON MOUNT ROY

Montreal, May 8.—Dr. Labrecque, head of the civic department of contagious diseases has sent a report to the controllers recommending the camp to accommodate tuberculosis patients be established on Mount Royal. He states that the disease is making such progress here that stringent methods must be taken and that a properly equipped camp would probably save 1,000 lives a year.
