STATE GERMAN EXPLORES SAFE ON ICE

Wireless Gives Hope of Arctic Party.

SCHROODER-STRAZ LONG THOUGHT LOST

Full Report Expected Today from Northern Norway - Dr. Robitzsch brings Good News to Relatives.

Bremen, Germany, July 23.—The rescue of the missing German Arctic explorer, L. Schrooder-Stranz, was apparently indicated in a wireless despatch received here today from the steamer Groszer Kurtner, which is cruising in Spitzbergen waters.

The message was as follows: "Dr. Robitzsch of the German observatory at Cross Bay came on board yesterday at Mosley Bay and made important communications about Schrooder-Stranz. Help has been received. A detailed report will be sent by wireless from Tromsø, northern Norway."

The Groszer Kurtner is due at Tromsø on Friday. From previous reports it was known that four members of the German expedition had died after suffering great privation and it was believed that L. Schrooder-Stranz and ten other members of the expedition also had perished.

Capt. Ritzscher returned alone to Advent Bay early in the year after a long and terrible overland journey and reported that a disaster had occurred. A Norwegian relief expedition was then sent out but failed to find the missing members of the party.

The Schrooder-Stranz expedition was composed of eleven Germans and five Norwegians and started for the north in June, 1912, on board the ship Herzog, commanded by Capt. Ritzscher.

None of the members of the expedition had had any Arctic experience and the expedition was regarded as an experiment to accustom its members to Arctic conditions with the object of undertaking later an attempt to find the northeastern passage.

The expedition was under the patronage of the Duke of Athol.

Mrs. Wade has been ill for some time and her death was unexpected. Besides those in St. John, two other sons, Clayton, in charge of the construction company's quarry at Hampstead, and Leonard, a contractor in Montreal, and four daughters, at home in England, survive.

RECOMMENDS A BIG FORESTRY SCHEME FOR NEW ENGLAND

Dr. B. E. Fernow, of Toronto to University, Gives Good Advice about Reforestation - Would Increase Values.

Sunapee, N. H., July 23.—The planting of five million acres of New England land with timber would easily find an annual market for ten million dollars, and would produce all the timber required by the people of that section, said Dr. B. E. Fernow, dean of the forestry school of the University of Toronto, Ont., in an address at the forestry conference today.

He cited instances where intelligent forestry has increased land values from five to ten fold in fifty years. For New England he recommended municipal enterprise in recovering waste lands, with state subvention, which he declared would be immensely profitable, and effect in furnishing supplies.

DR. OPPEN'S LAWYER WILL GO TO PRISON

Arthur Newton Sentenced to Three Years Hard Labor for Fraud—His Companion got 18 Months.

London, July 23.—A three years term of penal servitude was imposed today, at the Old Bailey sessions, on Arthur Newton, the lawyer who came into prominence during the trial of Dr. Crippen for murder.

He was charged with conspiracy to defraud Dr. Hans Thorsch, a wealthy young citizen of Vienna, out of \$115,000 by false pretences in 1911 and 1912.

Newton's companion, Berkeley Bennett, was sentenced at the same time to eighteen months' hard labor. The judge characterized the prisoners' action as a gross conspiracy to defraud Thorsch.

In the course of the testimony it was shown that Thorsch was induced by the conspirators to part with his fortune on the pretence that it was to be invested for him and the investments chosen were of the "wildcat" schemes.

WILLIAM ZEIGLER ENTITLED TO MONEY OF VAST ESTATE

New York, July 23.—William Zeigler, Jr., is entitled to \$4,000,000 which is the accumulated surplus income of the residuary estate of his father, the late William Zeigler, according to a decision by the surrogate today.

The decision was handed down after objection had been filed by Geo. R. Brandt of Chicago, a half-brother of the late multi-millionaire, Brandt, who had a remainder interest in the residuary estate upon certain conditions, contended that the accumulated income should become part of the body of the estate and should not be paid to Zeigler, Jr. This contention is now overruled.
