During the past season, which closed early last month, this mill cut about five millions of 2, 3 and 4 inch lumber, sill of which is shipped on the cars to the American markets. During the same season the mill manufactured four millions of laths which went to the St. John market.

The number of men employed in this work for the season's cutting is finished preparations are made for getting a new supply of logs, and, as in previous years, this gives employment to about two hundred men and sixty pairs of horses during the winter and driving season. The firm's operations during the winter months are on the north and south branches of the Bicaguinac, and this season it is expected that five and one-half millions of lumber will be turned into the stream to supply the mill at its mouth for next summer's cutting. All of the lumber cut during the winter is manufactured right here in Hartland, and the year's operations at this place amounts to the nice little sum of \$75,000 (not including store supplies).

The firm have been operating for twenty years, with about the same cut each year, and the total expenditure in that time for labor, hay, oats, etc., has been circulated among farmers, laborers, efc.

The figures given above are approximate, as the season's work varies somewhat owing to weather and other causes that cannot be calculated upon.

Then, there is what is known as the lower mill, run by other parties, and a large amount of lumber is manufactured there, giving employment to quite a number of men. The figures for the business done at this mill are not at hand, but they add, a very respectable amount to the grand total of the business done in this section of the province.
