DR. WHITE NEW PRESIDENT N. B. MEDICAL SOCIETY

Elected at Annual Meeting held yesterday at Fred-
erickton—Forty members of the profession present
at meeting—Dr. Malcolm, of St. John, elected Sec-
retary.

Frederickton, July 20.—The 35th an-
nual meeting of the New Brunswick
Medical Society opened this morning
at the City Council chamber, Dr. G.
Clowes Vanwart, of this city, president,
in the chair. There are upwards of 40
doctors here, 34 of whom enrolled this
morning.

The convention was opened with
prayer by Rev. J. E. Wilson, pastor
of George street Baptist church, and
His Worship Mayor Mitchell gave an
address of welcome to the delegates.

The minutes of the last meeting
were read, and the reception of dele-
gates and visitors was held. Dr. H.
R. Mason, of Calais, Maine, replying
for the visitors. Dr. Vanwart then
delivered his address. He laid particu-
lar stress on necessity of medical in-
spection in schools of this province.

After the president's address usual
routine business was transacted. Dr.
F. Fleming, of St. John, read a fine pa-
per on Blood Pressure, and Dr. J. G.
Nugent, of Chipman, gave an instruc-
tive paper on Toxins (Made in Cana-
da.) Dr. G. W. Bailey, of Fredericton
Junction, read an excellent paper, Hen-
och's Purpura, and the morning session
closed with a discussion on infant
feeding, led by Dr. L. M. Curran and
Dr. Skinner, of St. John.

Dr. Walter W. White, of St. John, is
the new president of the New Brun-
swick Medical Society, having been
elected this afternoon.

time was spent.




