Branch Missionary Society.

The annual meeting of the N. B. and P. E. I. Branch of the Women's Missionary Society will be held in Queen Square church, May 30th, 31st and June 1st. At the Tuesday evening meeting a missionary pageant "Olimpian Along the King's Highway" will be given by the various mission circles in costume. Mrs. Small of China will speak. Mrs. Small is a daughter of the Rev. Mr. Lawson, formerly of Zion church of this city. She has been in China for some years and will give an interesting talk.

On Wednesday evening Miss McLeod of Japan, a returned missionary, will give an address. Miss McLeod is from Woodstock, N. B.

Pantry Sale.
The pantry sale held by the following West Side ladies on Saturday was well attended. Mrs. Newcombe, Mrs. J. L. Duval, Mrs. A. Fraser, Mrs. Sudbury, Mrs. Martineau, Miss Gertrude Lawson, Miss Louise Driscoll, Mrs. William Tiley, Mrs. George Harriet and Miss Eva Newcombe. The proceeds are for tobacco for lone soldiers and quite a substantial sum was realized.

Women's Institutes.
The Campbellton W. I. has accomplished more patriotic work in the past year than any branch in the province. They have now in progress a cook-book, the proceeds of which are to go to the Patriotic Fund. Mrs. E. A. Smith's illustrated lecture on "Belgium Then and Now" very materially increased the contribution to the Belgian Relief Fund.

At Centre Napan the meetings are held in a hall built largely through the efforts of the institute. It is customary to have a debate once a year. It was held in March for 1916, the subject being, "Is the influence of the home to day as great over our girls and boys as of the homes of fifty years ago." The judges decided in favor of the affirmative side. The Prisoners' Relief Fund was generously remembered by this institute, \$25 having been forwarded in April. The Chocolate and Cinnamon Cove is a very busy branch which does considerable financial. Fourteen pairs of socks were shipped in April and more yarn purchased to continue the knitting. Three boxes containing food and clothing for the prisoners from Canada were sent to England, March 13th, and one box direct to Germany, March 22nd. A donation was voted for a band for the 140th Battalion.

Clifton—For March an interesting paper was read entitled, "The Origin

and Uses of Carpets and Rugs," and in May, Miss Adela Wetmore gave a paper on "Household Pests and Methods of Control." Through the efforts of the members, a piano has been purchased for the hall.

Cody's April meeting took the form of a social in the public hall. At the May meeting Rev. C. C. Currie addressed the members on "Women and Patriotism," and spoke very highly of the work done by this institute. The reverend gentleman brought his remarks to a close by calling on the community to raise its value in the eyes of the public by having a general cleaning-up day.

Corn Hill W. I.—Rather than take the funds from the institute treasury, to have the school-house scrubbed and cleaned, the members have volunteered to do the work themselves, and the money will be spent on patriotic work instead. After the "cleaning-up" a picnic will be held for the children. On King Alfred's birthday, the school children collected \$10.00 for the Belgian Relief Fund. Already \$42 have been raised on an autograph quilt, which will be sold at a public function in the near future, the proceeds for Red Cross work.

Debec W. I.—Mrs. Johnston gave an instructive paper on "The Parents' Relation to the School" at the April meeting. A collection of \$2.10 was taken for a prisoner of war which this branch has adopted. P. L. C. Lefebvre and a box weighing seven pounds and containing a number of good things was sent to Mrs. Rivers-Bulkeley of London, for another prisoner.

Dalhousie Junction W. I.—Last month was a very busy month for this institute. To Mrs. Rivers-Bulkeley the sum of \$18.95 was sent to spend on Canadian prisoners, and our soldiers enduring the hardships of German imprisonment were also sent eighteen boxes containing some of the few comforts they are allowed to have. Twenty pairs of socks have been completed and sent to headquarters. Various methods are adopted to raise money these times, and twice the members from Dalhousie Junction displayed their patriotic spirit by going to the school house and scrubbing the floors, receiving \$2.00 each time and giving it to the institute for Red Cross work.

Fair Haven W. I.—In April a committee was appointed to pack magazines for the soldiers, and in May plans were made to set apart May 24th as Decoration Day to clean up and decorate the graves in the cemetery.

Florenceville W. I.—Instead of the regular meeting with roll-call for March, this branch held a Blind Auction, March 17th. The proceeds were for the Belgian Relief Fund. The parcel price had been donated by the members and brought carefully disguised, were sold by auction. They contained a great variety of useful articles, including fashions, aprons, work aprons, dish towels, guest towels, gentlemen's ties, handkerchiefs, soap, work bags, etc. A candy booth, decorated in real St. Patrick's style, netted \$3.50 and the proceeds from the sale of parcels amounted to \$22.75. This money will be expended on patriotic work.

Fredericton Junction W. I.—A most enjoyable meeting was held in April when the Agricultural Society members were entertained. The program consisted of patriotic songs, addresses by both ladies and gentlemen, and the serving of refreshments, the latter

especially pleasing the men. A new library was started in March and a committee appointed to look after same.

Grand Falls, W. I.—Has forwarded so far sixty-five pounds of food and clothing to the Canadian prisoners of war. In March \$10.00 were spent on comforts for the soldiers and in order to keep funds on hand for patriotic work, a Red Cross Ball was held, the total receipts amounting to \$37.35.

Grand Harbor W. I. has adopted two Canadian prisoners and one remittance has been already sent forward.

Central Greenwich W. I.—Miss Lyon the school teacher read a helpful paper at the March meeting entitled "How the Parents May Help the School." An Easter box was sent to each soldier at the front enlisting from this community.

Hammond and Markhamville W. I.—The Darning Contest held by the members of this branch, resulted in the prize going to Mrs. W. P. Fowler.

Legal Don'ts For Women.
Caroline J. Cook, lecturer on law at Wellesley College, has recently issued a list of legal "don'ts" for women. Here is Miss Cook's list: a note or agree to be sure for any debt, unless you are willing and can afford to pay the amount yourself. Never vary from this rule, even in the case of your husband, your father, or your dearest woman friend.

Don't write your name on a blank piece of paper. Many women have done it and bitterly regretted it for the rest of their days.

Don't give an unlimited power of attorney to any one. It is absolutely necessary to give one at all, be sure that it is given only for what is needed, and limit the time as much as possible.

Don't do anything in business matters "for politeness" which your judgment tells you should not do.

In short, don't give any promise or sign any paper whatever until you are sure you know the legal effect of it on yourself and your family.

Don't write anything, even in a friendly letter, which you would not be willing to have used as evidence in court. On the other hand, don't destroy any letter or paper which may have a bearing on a business or legal matter.

Don't consent to your husband's signing his will, power of attorney, or any other legal document, unless it is necessary by extraordinary living. Don't buy furniture, books, or anything else for which you cannot afford to pay cash. If you think of buying on the installment plan, first estimate what the interest will amount to, and add it to the price of the goods; then find out the cost of goods of the same quality at a cash store, and compare the figures. Realize that you own one of the goods bought on installments until you have paid for all, and that a failure to keep any portion of your agreement may cause you to lose all that you have paid.

Don't keep your name, rich or poor, waiting for money you owe them. It could tell you some true and tragic stories which would make an over-dressed dressmaker's bill a veritable nightmare to you.

Don't be penny wise and pound foolish. Get good advice when you need it, pay for it, and act upon it. Preventive measures, always remember, are the most satisfactory and the cheapest in the end.
