Most of the ills of life are avoidable. It is within the power of the average person to be healthy and attractive and to remain so. What a pity that more people do not think it worth while to gain and keep this priceless bloom of health, without which all else is valueless.

GARDENING IN APRIL.

April is the month of planting in the open. The gardener and his work go outdoors. Just when to begin planting, however, must be left to great extent to the gardener's own judgment. If he is experienced he will not be misled by April's smiles nor discouraged by her frowns. A safe plan to follow is to plant the seed of the hardiest flowers and vegetables as soon as the ground is in condition to be worked. In the vegetable garden, for instance, when the soil is spaded, plant at once onions, both seed and sets, and smooth varieties of peas, turnips, radish, early beets and spinach. In the flower garden, plant sweet peas, poppies and centaurias. When peach or pear trees are in bloom, some of the less hardy flowers and vegetable seed should be planted, such as pansies, salicy, kohlrabi, summer spinach, wrinkled peas and cabbage; cauliflower, beet, lettuce and onion plants, grown indoors, should be set out. When the apples come into blossom, plant the tender things, such as corn, cucumbers, gourds, melons and pumpkins. But indoor grown plants of peppers, tomatoes, melons, eggplant, okra and similar tender vegetables should not be transplanted to the open ground until danger of late frosts is practically at an end. Should a late frost, however, make its appearance—as it frequently does—when the gardener has estimated that spring is advanced beyond that point, it is well to remember that most plants will survive if afforded only slight protection. Have at hand, ready for use, old newspapers and pins of wire or of wood. Cover the plants on the approach of a sudden drop in temperature, with the newspapers and fasten them, or anchor them in place by means of the pins. This covering, light as it is, will oftentimes bring plants safely through even a protracted season of frosty weather.—Woman's World for April.

FOR A CHANGE.

Poached eggs with onion sauce may be novel to some housewives. The following recipe is taken from the cook book of the famous Delmonico kitchen. Put two quarts of water in a frying pan with a little vinegar and salt. Drop the eggs in carefully, one after the other, and allow the water to boil. As soon as the eggs are firm take from the fire and drain on a napkin. Prepare the sauce by cutting four onions in halves, halving very fine and banching in boiling water for three minutes. Drain and put in a frying pan with a little butter and white bouillon and allow to simmer until the onions are cooked. Drain

END OF ROAST MEAT.

Butler a deep dish, put a layer of cold meat, layer of sliced raw onions, layer of sliced raw potatoes, pepper, salt and small pieces of butter. Continue this until dish is full, then half cover with hot water and add a little gravy. If you have any. Cover dish and bake from one to three hours. Remove cover about twenty minutes before serving so top will brown.


