## BRITISH AIR FIGHTING BY THE BRITISH

Nine German Machines Disabled on Saturday—Most Severe Air Engagements Recently Ever Known.

London, July 21.—The official report from British headquarters in France tonight reads:—  
"The enemy's artillery has shown great activity during the day in the Lombarde sector. Four German aeroplanes were successfully bombed yesterday by our aeroplanes."  
"Bombs also were dropped on an important enemy railway junction, causing a large explosion."  
"Three hostile machines were brought down; six others were driven down out of control. Four of our aeroplanes are missing."

**Heavy Fighting.**  
Not since the war began has such severe air fighting been witnessed on the British front as has taken place recently. Great squadrons of opposing aeroplanes have clashed in bitter and spectacular battles. From the outset the British airmen maintained the upper hand and today it may be said, still hold the ascendancy in this branch of the service. Since July 12th, the British have brought down at least forty-one German machines, have driven down thirty-seven others out of control and have carried out innumerable successful bombing raids on enemy aerodromes, railways, stations and other important points. On the other hand, British have only had twenty-eight machines listed as missing.

**Thrilling Stories.**  
Many thrilling stories are being related of daring deeds performed by the allied aviators. One British machine carrying the pilot and an observer sighted five enemy machines flying together. Despite these odds, the British airmen dashed to the attack. Sweeping in and about their opponents, they sent one Fokker crashing to earth, and drove another out of control. The British pilot was killed at this stage of the fight but the observer brought the machine home carrying the body of his comrade.

Another British aviator tackled single handed a squadron of fifteen Germans. He was soon joined by another pilot, but he alone accounted for two German machines after repeatedly facing what seemed sure destruction.

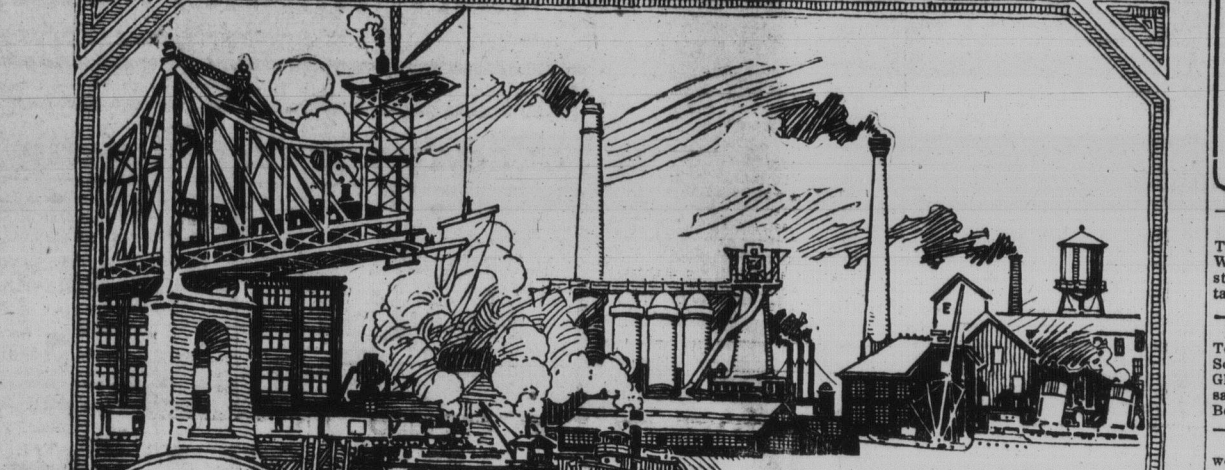

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land**  
Regulations.  
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or sub-agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—made on land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in homesteaded patent and cultivation of land for six months. Six months residence upon earning extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homesteaded patent on certain conditions.
