Important Questions Answered by Contest Manager and Matters of General Interest Discussed—Contestants Should Watch This Corner

Question: Is it permissible to have more than one section of circles in the first left-hand column and in the last column on the right as well?
Answer: You are allowed to have one or more sections of circles in the first left-hand column. You may also have more than one section of circles in the last column on the right. It is permissible to have more than one section of circles in any column provided you follow the rules in drawing your chain of circles across the chart. See problem in this regard about where two sections, or parts of sections, run parallel, that there must be at least one row of figures between them, so as to preserve clearly the course of the chain. Also see problem and illustration about it being permissible for corner circles

to touch obliquely. Finally, be sure to start in the first column on the left and to end in the last column on the right. Have at least one section of figures enclosed in these two columns.
Question: What do you mean by your second puzzle by odd and even figures?
Answer: Any number in this puzzle that you can divide evenly by two is considered an even number. Such numbers as 12, 15, 26, 32, 40 and 98 are considered even numbers; 9, 21, 37, 45, 63 or 87 are odd numbers.
Question: How do you add up your odd and even figures?
Answer: Add them up just as you have them enclosed. Don't attempt, for instance, to take the number 29 and add it up as 2 in the even column or 9 in the odd column. Add it up in your odd column as 29.

REAL ESTATE FIRM TO SELL CITY HOUSE

Decision to sell the remaining houses on the Pine Lawn Survey through the London Land Development Company was made by the housing commission at a special meeting Monday afternoon. There are 42 houses in the group. Five have been sold. COLD SNAP CAUSING ANXIETY TO FRUIT- GROWERS OF DISTRICT

No Damage Done As Yet, Is Report Received.

The cold snap which has followed the mild, springlike weather which prevailed up to Easter, is causing considerable anxiety to growers of early fruits in various parts of the country. On the American side, approximately \$1,000,000 worth of damage is reported to have been done to the fruit crop in Oklahoma, while communications from Kalamazoo, Michigan, state that the freezing weather there has probably resulted in loss of thousands of dollars' worth of destruction to peaches and early cherries.

Fortunately peaches are not extensively grown in Middlesex and neighboring counties, and in any case the crop, such as it is, comes along later than in the south, so that the loss in this respect is negligible, but considerable quantities of early cherries, plums and apricots are grown, and if these were assailed at a critical period it would be disastrous.

So far as can be ascertained, however, the fruit buds, although showing signs of development, are not far enough advanced to be affected by frost such as that which has so transformed the genial conditions of the past few days, and on the whole, growers are glad to see the cold dip come now and not later, when the blossoms are beginning to open out. The buds are still protected by their cold-weather sheath, but when the temperature drops towards zero after the blossoms have appeared it is fatal to the fruit yield. "So," as one horticulturist remarked, "if there is more cold weather to come let us have it now, and we shall be sorer of having seasonable conditions later."

BIRD NOTES

(Contributed by Melvyn Orin, Ornithological Club.)

Very often on a fine bright day when one would expect the birds to be very much in evidence, the number notes in a ramble through the country is surprisingly small. Then on a rough, stormy day, when outdoor conditions are very uninviting, the one who does venture forth is often amply repaid. This latter was the case on Saturday, February 26, when the stormiest days of the winter. A driving snowstorm was in progress when the start was made, and both members of the party had secretly hoped that the other fellow would not turn up at the rendezvous, so that an excuse might be afforded for not going.
The list that day totaled eight species and over twelve hundred individuals, including one that had not previously been recorded. A large flock of crows seeking shelter in the cedar swamp northeast of Wolseley Barracks helped to swell the total, but the most interesting was a pair of prairie horned larks, between 450 and 500 being recorded, in flocks of some 40 to 200 birds. This is the earliest spring migrant to reach us, and a few remain to nest in the fields nearby. It is hard to explain how so many should be concentrated here at one time, as the number reported that day was more than one might expect to see in a lifetime. The bird is a relative of the English

skylark and derives its name from the fact that it was formerly found only on each side of the head, so as to extend its range, however, until now prairie horned lark.
