Washington, Feb. 15.—Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, brought up his proposals for naval disarmament today in introducing an amendment to the pending naval appropriation bill a provision authorizing and requesting the president to call a conference of representatives of Great Britain, Japan and the United States on the subject.

"The conference," the amendment provides, "shall be charged with the duty" of reaching an understanding or agreement by which naval building of the three powers "shall be substantially reduced" annually during the next five years.

Toronto, Feb. 15.—Albert Elliott, caretaker of the Forum Building, which was destroyed by fire on the night of Jan. 27, when a number of inmates escaped from the flames in their night apparel, told Provincial Fire Marshal Heaton today that his dog saved his life and that of his wife. Both were asleep when the dog began to pull at the bed clothing.

None of the witnesses at the inquiry today could account for the fire. Fire Marshal Heaton adjourned the inquiry indefinitely. He expressed the opinion that the fire was not accidental, but was started by design.

Toronto, Feb. 15.—It is understood that an amendment will be made to the Ontario temperance act giving a convicted person the right under the act to appeal to the county judge, although Attorney-General Raney is opposed to this. Premier Raney tonight said he thought there should be an appeal to the county judge, but he said the government would not agree to permit cases to be entirely reopened on appeal and new evidence introduced.
