

White Hall and also from their present Villages of Caughnawaga or Sault St Louis, as far up the Saint Lawrence as Oswego on the South side - At present these poor Indians occupy no hunting grounds, the whole of that Country being now thickly settled - When on their hunting excursions for Deer they frequent a Strip of unsettled & mountainous land between Chateaugay & Pinebriar Brook where there still are a few Deer - These Indians have received no remuneration, like the Upper Canada Indians for the hunting grounds that they have been deprived of -

th Query The persons employed in the superintendence of the settled Indians, or of the other Tribes, with their designations, and Salaries and a summary of the duties they have to perform -

Answer - The persons employed in the District of Montreal to superintend the settled and unsettled Indians - are as follows - one Superintendent who resides in Montreal - Salary £105, 13, 4 Ster per An - with a Captain of the army's allowances - one Resident at Saint Regis - Salary £92, 17, 2 Ster per An. with the same allowances as Supt - Four Interpreters stationed as follows - one at Montreal, one at the Village of Sault St Louis, one at Lake of two Mountains and one at Three Rivers each receiving the pay of 4/4 per diem £17 Ster lodging money, with half the allowances of Supt - The Interpreters stationed at the different Villages have not very heavy duties to perform - Their business is, to see that peace and unanimity reign amongst the Tribe, To prevent the Whites from imposing on the Indians (which they invariably do when an opportunity offers) To see that no liquor is sold in the village to any Individual, and also to prevent the Whites from purchasing Indian presents from the Indians, such as their Clothing Blankets, Guns
