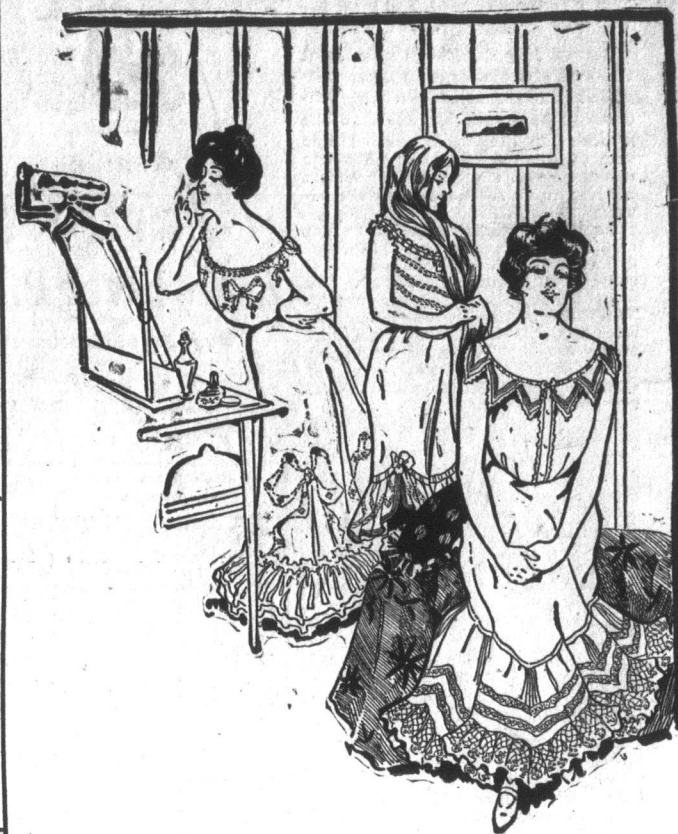

Speaking of the flash visit of the vice-regal party, Mayor McKeough said: "The Reception committee thought that it was better to go over the whole route, as advertised, quickly than to skip any portion of it. It was only at the last moment that the time of the visit was curtailed from an hour and a half to an hour and fifteen minutes."
