When letters are registered for when revers are registered for whatever destination, both postage and registration fees should be pre-paid by stamps. The postage and registration fee on letters addressed States, and places abroad, must be paid wholly in stamps or money.

A Registered letter can only be deliverou to the party addressed or to his or her order. The registration does not make the Post Office responsible for its safe delivery, it simply makes its transmission more secure, by rendering it practicable to trace it when passing from one place to another in Canada, and at least to the frontier or port of despatch.
