THE GOVERNMENT AND AGRICULTURE -The House of Representatives at Washington have passed a bill donating land to the several States for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts. The bill was introduced by Mr. Morrill, and passed by yeas 104, nays 101. It grants six millions three hundred and forty thousand acres of land, to be apportioned to each State in a proportionate degree with its number of Senators and Representatives—which is equal to twenty thousand acres for each Senator and Representative in Congress—to which the States are now respectively entitled.
