ALBERT FOSTER PASSES AWAY

Brant County Treasurer Died at His Home Friday Night.

Deeply mourned—County Treasurer Albert Foster passed away last night at his home in Mount Pleasant after a brief illness. The end, which was unexpected, came suddenly, indeed only on Tuesday, he was reported to be progressing favourably towards recovery from the illness which assailed him on Saturday last. Hearty and well, he was sitting quietly humming in his office last Saturday, when his friends in business dropped in to see him. Later, as he was homeward bound on the car, he was stricken ill with his old complaint and he never left his bed. The news of his death will be learned with deep regret to a vast circle of friends for the sterling qualities of Mr. Foster had earned the respect and reverence of all with whom he came in contact. Quiet and unostentatious, he was heard from him, but behind his modest manner, there was a word which was his bond. As County Treasurer he was greatly trusted and his work was always well and conscientiously carried out. Born in Scotland some 40 years ago Mr. Foster followed the footsteps of his father and succeeded him as Township Clerk and also in the business establishment, that of furniture dealing and funeral undertaking. After many years as Township Clerk, he was appointed County Treasurer on the 6th day of January, 1896, in succession to the late W. S. Campbell, who died in the preceding December. So well did he fulfill his duties that he was appointed Township Treasurer in February, 1904, succeeding Mr. Charles Good in that capacity. The positions he held to the end.

ARTILLERY NOT THERE
GENEVA, Oct. 24.—None of the German heavy artillery has arrived before Verdun or Belfort as yet, according to a correspondent of the Tribune, who has returned to Basel after visiting the French and German frontier for a week.
