Thomas Walters has received an ineresting letter from Private Wilson. with the first Canadian contingent in South Africa. Private Wilson writes as follows:

Dear Friend-I take pleasure in an swering your kind and welcome letter, which I received about a week ago. which I received about a week ago.
It found me well and happy, and I hope this will find you the same.
Well, Tom, I must thank you for sending me a parcel. I have not received it yet, but I expect to in a few days. Some of the boys have received their parcels, which came out lew days. Some of the boys have received their parcels, which came out
on the same boat. They haven't sent
all the parcels up from the cape yet.
Thomas, you asked me to send you
something from here. I have not
many relics to send and I hardly
know what to select, but I made up



forward you a flag of the Orange Free State, and a Kruger shilling. I wish it were some of Kruger's whiskers in

it were some of Kruger's whiskers instead of the shilling, but it is the best I have got just now.

You asked me how I liked soldiering out here. Well, it is all right as long as there is no sand, but it is a terrible place when the sand storms are on. But there is no sand here; we got all there was at Belmont.
That was a terrible place. We were glad to get out of it. We have a fine camp here. We are right at home now since we got our tents. We had a hard time of it for over a month. We had no tents and had to sleep out at pixel and et and all kinds of weather. at night and stand all kinds of weather. We are having some terrible weather here, it is raining every day. I do not know what we would have done if we had not had our tents. We done if we had not had our tents. We are wading in mud ankle deep now and it puts me in mind of Chatham when the roads are bad. I think the sconer we get out of here the better for us, for there is a terrible lot of sickness. There are 1,800 in the hospital here. There are about a hundred Canadians sick. We buried three Canadians the other day and one died vesterday. I guess there wont be yesterday. I guess there wont be many of us left to go back if we stay here much longer. I think we are going to make a move in a few days. They say we are going on the Pretoria. I hope we do, but I don't want to march there for at is 300 miles from

Well, I guess you do hear great ru-Well, I guess you do hear great ru-mors of the war, something like our-selves. We hear so many that we get tired of them. I haven't got any news-to send you for we haven't done any-thing since we came here. We had a few hard marches out about 20 miles to the battle of Watervall Drift. We were not in the scrap but we could see were not in the scrap, but we could see the shells bursting. I would have lik-ed to have had a crack at them for I was not in the battle of Paardeberg. I was sick in the hospital at Orange River, with fever, at the time. So haven't killed any Boers yet, but may get a chance at them still. I can't tell you further what is going on just now. We haven't heard anything of Buller since he. left Ladysmith. We don't know where he is or what is going on. You know more about it than we do. We don't get any news till after you get it. I see about it than we do. We don't get any news till after you get it. I see you had a big time in Chatham over the relief of Ladysmith.

Well, I think I have told all the news this time, so I will draw my letter to a close by saying good bye. From your friend,
