Germany Will Demand a Few Million for the Slaughter of Baron von Ketteler.

New York, Nov. 2.—Comprehensive instructions bearing on the indemnity this government will demand of China have gone to Minister Conger, says a Washington special to the Herald. Administration officials decline to discuss their character, but the demands this government will submit will be moderate. They will comprise restitution for injuries suffered by will be moderate. They will comprise restitution for injuries suffered by Aermicans, and damage to their property and reimbursement of expenses incurred in sending the expedition to China. It cannot be learned that this government has determined on the exact amount to be demanded, but whatever it is it will probably be accepted in Chinese bonds, which are to be taken up by China in installments. It is likely that Germany will file a claim of several millions for the death of Baron von Ketteler, So far as the inforamtion of the state department goes, satisfactory progress is being made by the ministers in reaching agreements as to the demands to be submitted to China.

Winnipeg Centre Reverses a Majority Given in the Provincial Election-Political Notes.

This was the only nomination made and they claim the seat by acclamation. Sheriff Varin postponed the election because he claimed he had no list of the voters in the unorganized district. The whole matter is one of law and an application will be made for a mandamus to compel the sheriff to declare Mr. Klock elected.
