RELEASE OF THE FREEMANS.

The fact that there were only twenty-five indictments for murder during the year 1899 in Canada is attributed to the swift and sure administration of punishment, and the statistics are in pleasing contrast with those of the United States.—The Mail.

That swift and sure justice in Canada has been turned into ridicule hereabouts by Hon. David Mills. He released the other day two men who were participants in a most brutal murder. Had they been tried here their chances of capital punishment were very probable. But their trial was changed to that centre of misadventure, London, and they got off with life. Now, they are released after serving only seven years. As to why this was done Mr. Mills should explain. Had the people of Chatham at the time imagined such a thing possible these men would probably have been lynched. And David Mills, by his action, has made it certain that should a similar crime ever again occur in these parts no trust will be placed by the public in the law. It is hinted that this release was the result of a political deal. That may or may not be so, but if lynching is introduced into Canada it will be because the minister of justice has shaken the faith of the people in the law.

## THE AUSTRALIAN COMMON-WEALTH AND PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

A despatch from Sydney, New South Wales, to the London Express says: "The indications are that the first Federal Cabinet will adopt the moderate Protectionist platform, and, under an adequate system of reciprocity, will accept the Canadian principle of preferential tariffs with Great Britain."

The Commonwealth, however, will not tolerate the treatment which the Imperial government has meted out to the Dominion. It will gladly concede preferential treatment, but it will demand an equivalent."

An Australian correspondent of the Express is writing in blaming the Imperial government for not granting Canada an equivalent for the preferential treatment accorded to British manufactures in the Canadian market. There is no reason whatever to question the willingness of the British government to concede preference for preference. A joint request from the Dominion and the Commonwealth for a preference in the markets of the United Kingdom would have enormous weight just now with the Imperial government. The truest patriotism and the truest imperialism is not for the colonies to assume a position of inferiority in negotiating commercial arrangements with the mother country; but to aim at such conditions as being mutually advantageous to both mother country and colonies, will tend to ensure the permanent unity of the Empire. A long step in the right direction would be taken if the colonial statesmen would apply themselves to the problem of arranging a basis of mutual preferential trade between the colonies. The federation of the Australian provinces has, we think, abolished the last free trade colony in the British Empire. This should make the task of arranging a scheme of inter-colonial preferential trade easy.

## MR. WHITNEY'S POLICY.

At a banquet held in Weston Thursday night, Mr. Whitney touched upon some of the points of his platform.

His critics, Mr. Whitney declared, said that he had no policy. Why, they themselves had adopted two at least of the principal planks in his platform. One was the embargo upon logs. Another was the decision announced by Mr. Ross at Port Perry as to the formation of a Consultative Council to assist the Minister of Education. Only, Mr. Ross had suggested that Mr. Whitney should nominate half of the members and the government the other half. In this way the council would simply represent two opposite schools of opinion, Mr. Whitney observed. His plan was that the council should be composed of men representing every teaching body, public school teachers, high school teachers, and the universities. In that way they would get experts. Among the things which they would do, if returned to power, Mr. Whitney went on, would be:

1. At the earliest possible moment to manage the finances that the burden of direct taxation should be removed and the Province freed from the stigma of having it.
2. When the finances have been put in a proper position, to increase the sums devoted to the encouragement of agriculture.
3. At once to change the educational system so that the objects of the founders of that system will be carried out. The public school should be an independent institution by itself, and Whitney sharply assailed what he described as Mr. Ross' theory that the public school should be the step-stone to the high school, the high school to the collegiate institute, the collegiate institute to the university. Mr. Whitney concluded by declaring that, after having had an opportunity of putting into execution this policy, they would accept without a murmur the honest verdict of the people of Ontario.

## SEPARATE CAR FOR DRUNKS.

State Railway Administration of Stockholm Provides Them.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Stockholm says that complaints have been made that the guards of night trains during the Christmas festivities ejected inebriated passengers at roadside stations, leaving them helpless in the snow, with the thermometer 12 degrees below zero. The State railway administration has accordingly ordered that every suburban train at night must be provided with a separate car, for intoxicated persons only.

## THE ROYAL BOX.

The Princess of Wales has \$50,000 a year in pin money.

The life of the late Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha was insured for \$1,500,000. Dom Carlos I, artist and king of Portugal, has received a silver medal at the Paris exhibition for a marine sketch in pastel.

Queen Victoria is contemplating a trip to Germany to visit the Empress Frederick. It is probable that she will leave Balmoral early in October and that she will also pay a visit to Coburg.

Tawhiao is the name of a native king in New Zealand who edits a little eight page paper, with three columns to a page, printed in both the English and the native tongue and called The Pictorial or Seven Stars.

The Austrian emperor's crown was recently photographed in order to correct imperfect representations of it on coins and official documents. The crown is regarded as one of the finest works of European goldsmiths. The material alone is worth \$50,000.

The Sultan is said to be in a very nervous state. Recently, it is said, he fainted in his park at Yildiz and was carried indoors by one of his black attendants. On returning to consciousness of the servant, who might have abandoned him to the tender mercies of any one who wished to murder him, that he presented him with \$10,000.

## POULTRY POINTERS.

Variety of food is essential to the well being and productiveness of fowls.

Length of body is one important requisite in the breeding of fowls if weight is desired.

The composition of eggs requires a variety of materials, and these are found in plain, cheap food.

On the average farm one good, active cockerel is sufficient for 15 or 18 hens.

The first indications of roup are froth in the corners of the eyes, usually accompanied by wheezing.

One of the best ways of destroying a hen's digestion and inviting an array of diseases is to continue feeding soft foods.

One advantage of buying the breeding stock in the fall is the better chance of getting the best selection and at lower prices.

If the hens that are on good range become too fat, the better plan is to shut to food and compel them to scratch and hunt for a living.

The Langshans, Plymouth Rocks and Wyandottes are all good layers and good table fowls. The Wyandottes lay rather more eggs than the Plymouth Rocks. The Langshans are rather the best winter layers, but their carcasses are more difficult to dress nicely.
