For the information of your readers, we report having a letter to-day from our correspondent in San Francisco, Cal., saying:
"We have not had the pleasure of hearing from you for some time. We write to ask whether you have a large crop of beans in Canada this year, and how prices are ruling. The recent damage to the Michigan crop has had the effect of advancing prices in California and we are getting 3 1/2c for California beans to-day, which is equivalent to 4c in New York, or 4 1/4c delivered throughout the U. S."

"It looks to us as though the price of white beans will continue to advance right along through the winter as our crop is short and we do not see where people are going to get their beans this year."
