UNPLEASANT
SUSPICIONS

Inquest Into The Cause Of
Death Of Thomas Stone-
fish At Highgate

VERDICT IS NOT KNOWN

The inquest into the cause of the death of Thomas Stonefish, the Indian who was killed on the reserve near Highgate on Saturday last, was held last night at Highgate. It has not yet been learned in this city what verdict was brought in.

The evidence as given at the inquest went to show that the deceased with his brother, Daniel Stonefish, were out on the reserve shooting mink. They scared up a mink and the two of them were in pursuit of it when the deceased met his death. The brother claimed that Thomas was running along carrying a rifle when he fell and in some way the gun went off, and the bullet entered the back of his neck. It is possible that a man could shoot himself in the back of the neck, but the suspicion was aroused in the minds of some that it was also improbable. The inquest was for the purpose of clearing up this point. It was thought that the deceased might have got in the way, and might have been shot by someone who was aiming at the mink.

Crown Attorney H. D. Smith was present while the evidence was being given at the inquest, but was forced to leave before the verdict was brought in.

The list includes twenty-three members, which is an increase of nine over the late council.

CHILDREN'S AID

The regular monthly meeting of the Advisory Board of the Kent Children's Aid Society was held Monday afternoon at 4.30 in the County Clerk's office. There were present Mesdames Smith, Stephenson, J. L. Bray, Goodland, Newbury, Fraser, Williams, Sheldon, Taffs, Ed. Taylor and Pilkey, and Messrs. Paterson, Macaulay, Somerville, Baxter and Dr. R. V. Bray.

The Executive officer reported since December: Visits made 15, letters written 33, interviews 18, cases reported 2, embracing six children; investigated one and one still under observation; children looked after temporarily 2, children made wards of society 1.

After the report had been fully explained it was adopted.

Accounts amounting to \$50.55 were ordered paid.

Donations were acknowledged from the Busy Bees Society of \$5, Mrs. E. Peters, Blenheim, \$1; Miss Alice Estabrook, of Glenwood, \$1; Mrs. Newbury, \$5; pupils and teachers of C. C. I., \$30.35.

The Executive officer reported having written to the city and county councils asking them to appoint two of their members to the Board. He also reported having written to the village and township councils of the county asking for grants to the funds of the society.

Some of the visiting committee presented reports of the families under their care, and it was found that help was being extended to about 20 families in the way of clothing, school books, shoes, etc.

A list of names was submitted of people who would likely accept positions on the Board, and the Executive officer was empowered to see them in reference to the matter.

The committee on membership will continue their work during the month of January.

One child from the county was committed to the Industrial school for girls.

After some minor discussion the Board adjourned.

Any person having any second-hand clothing suitable for boys or girls between the ages of 3 and 9, would confer a favor on the society by sending them to Mrs. Sheldon, Harvey St.

Eighty-seven of the Collegiate Institute pupils donated 25 cents, entitling them to membership in the society.
