The Morning Chronicle defends the Halifax Herald for selling its columns to help the election of Liberals by saying that a newspaper is a purely business enterprise. Has the Chronicle, then, no principle except to make money for its stockholders? Some people have supposed from the high moral lectures of the Chronicle that it thought there were other things worth considering, but it seems even its moral exhortations are to be estimated at their financial value. However, after defending the Herald for selling its space to promote the election of Liberals the Chronicle does not hesitate to have repeated flings at the Herald for thus disposing of its space. It informs the Herald that it will publish this and that article "free of charge." Thus while it defends the Herald one day it assails that journal on the next, and all for the same reason—but the Chronicle is a great paper.

The Liberals of Kings county who elected Sir Frederick Borden by a large majority cannot understand why the Liberal papers throughout the Dominion ascribe the Liberal victory in Nova Scotia to Mr. Fielding, and omit all reference to Sir Frederick. They say, Sir Frederick did many great things; that he dismissed Donald at the bidding of Mr. Fisher; that Sir Frederick has been knighted and Mr. Fielding has not been so honored; that Sir Frederick fought in opposition for years, while Mr. Fielding was luxuriating in office, and they cannot understand why he should be ignored and all the credit be given to Mr. Fielding. Mr. Fielding seems ever to get the credit for Sir Frederick's victory in King's. The Liberals feel that their immense sacrifice in voting for Sir Frederick are not appreciated by the party, and that King's county does not win the fame to which its adherence to the Canning Knight, as they consider, justly entitles it.

The Liberals are very anxious to find a seat for Mr. R. L. Borden. They are ready to do almost anything to get him back as Conservative leader. They will allow him to run without opposition! They seem to think the country's interests will be safe unless Mr. Borden leads the opposition. Whence this anxiety? Is the Government's majority not sufficiently large to take care of the country? Must they have Mr. Borden's help? We have not heard that they did much to secure his election. They cut in the front.

Is not the glory of electing a government enough? Must the Liberals elect the opposition leader? If they elect him, must he be as subservient as their own ministers and followers? What promise of good behavior must he give as a condition of his election?

Or can it be that they are afraid Mr. Borden may be succeeded by a leader who will be more troublesome than Mr. Borden has been? We surmise that their interest in Mr. Borden's election does not spring from pure benevolence. The Liberals are not in politics out of love for the Conservatives—not at all.

That the result of the late elections in Canada was satisfactory, at least to the people of the United States would appear from the following sections of headlines from several newspapers of New England: Boston Journal—'Portland Boom is Assured by Canada's Verdict; Liberals Again Sent to Control Affairs in the Dominion. Boston American—'Canada's Fate Gives a Boom to Portland; Liberal Victory Assures New Road to the Maine City, and Big Business. Portland Argus—'Decisive Victory for Laurier, Grand Trunk and Portland.'

Mr. R. W. Starr's Death.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.

DEAR SIR,—I cannot understand why Mr. Oakes should endeavor to place me on record as opposing Government Ownership of Railroads. I certainly never expressed myself either in public or privately at any time, within the last two years at least, as being in favor of heavily subsidized railways being handed over to private corporations to do as they please with.

I believe that what we pay for we should own and control—and have always spoken and acted on that belief. I do not remember the exact words used by me when speaking at the meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade referred to by him in his letter in the Chronicle of the 2nd inst. But as I am very apt to say in plain words just what I think, there must be some gross mistake on his part as to my language on that occasion. I did at that meeting advocate the improvement of the Intercolonial from Halifax to Moncton—as a Government Road—and gave my reasons for it. At Moncton I moved a resolution to the same effect. It was spoken to approvingly by men from all parts of the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Oakes among the rest, and passed unanimously.

It followed immediately after the discussion and resolution in favor of the Past Atlantic Service, and was shown to be a necessary adjunct to that measure, in order to its final success.
