THE EASTERN QUESTION

The Work of the Congress Progressing.

and Herzegovina, and possibly NorthernAlbania.

A Berlin despatch says:—The session of the Congress to day lasted two hours and a half. It is believed the Congress will have completed the discussion of the principal questions to be decided by it by the end of this week. It will only have next week to formally sanction the decisions of the committee of second plenipctentiaries, presided over by Prince Hohenlohe, which commenced its series of preliminary deliberations on Saturday. It has been decided that Servis aball retain Nisch, but not Novi-Bazar, the Kopavnik defile forming the western frontier of the new territory. The Servian delegates declare themselves satisfied. The Montenegrins are dissatisfied, especially at obtaining nothing on the south. Antivari is to be declared a neutral port, but open to Austrian memof-war.

The question of the navigation of the Danube and the war indemnity were discussed in the Congress. It seems the latter is not definitely settled, and there is

The question of the navigation of the Danube and the war indemnity were discussed in the Congress. It seems the latter is not definitely sottled, and there is some doubt concerning the former, which, however, is at least on the point of settlement on the basis of existing regulations, namely, that navigation shall be politically unimpeded, and shall be controlled by a mixed scientific commission. It is said Austria has proposed that the neutral boundary be carried much further up the stream than at present, and that all fortifications on the banks be razed. The discussion on these proposals was postponed. On the indemnity question England, France, and Italy refused to recognize priority for Russia's pecuniary claim, Russia disclaimed any intention of claiming priority or exacting territory instead of money.
