NEW FERRY AND WORK ON BRIDGE

To Start Right Away—Wire Ferry for the Season Only remedy Available

The Observer has heard indirectly from the local government to the effect that a wire ferry will be established a short distance below the bridge. A point a little below the school house opposite to where C. E. Barnett has a road down the gulch to the river is the best available site. There is sufficient water at all times and a very good current—which is necessary to running a cable ferry. The approach at both sides can be readily made passable for teams and autos. The building of the boat commences at Hartland today and the cable is on the way.

A full force of draughtsmen under the proper engineer have been busy at work for several days preparing working plans for the new concrete piers. The one washed away will be first removed and the superstructure will be built as rapidly as possible. All the piers will be rebuilt this summer and the new spans placed thereon.

The wooden spans are not to be considered permanent but will be replaced by steel and the wooden superstructure ultimately find places where needed in bridges across smaller streams.

Supt. Fletcher was in Fredericton during the week and expects work will be resumed forthwith.

MONTHLY MEETING TOWN FATHERS

Returned Soldiers Ask Relief—Town Streets to be Officially Named.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Town Fathers on Monday evening there was a full board present, that is, all the aldermen were there, Mayor Keith in the chair.

S. G. Barter representing the G. W. V. A. reported the names of 10 returned men in Hartland liable to a poll tax for 1919 from which the men are asking to be relieved. As the names of these men had just been handed in, the committee in charge was continued to report at the June meeting.

The town treasurer reported a bank balance of \$1,555 and receipts during April of \$405.

Alm. Baker, for the Street Committee, submitted a report fixing the street line in front of the proposed Bank of Montreal building.

Aldermen Aiton, Morgan and Baker were appointed a committee to name the streets of the town.

GREAT IMPERIAL PRESS CONFERENCE

Will Traverse St. John Valley St. John to Edmundston—Not to Be Diverted to North Shore

In July and August Canada will be visited by the Imperial Press Conference which will consist of 160 of the greatest journalists in the British Empire. Among these is Lord Northcliffe, the greatest newspaper owner in the world, Lord Durham, Sir George Newnes, and noted newspaper men of London, Manchester, Liverpool, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dublin as well as representatives from India, Straits Settlement, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. The party will land at Halifax and proceed to the Pacific coast and return, making a six weeks' tour.

The local interests in this noteworthy excursion is that the party will traverse the whole St. John Valley from St. John to Edmundston. If the beauties of the St. John Valley are not exploited as they should be The Observer asks what on earth can give them so much world fame as the visit of these great men?

Last week provincial dailies announced that the excursion would go St. John to Fredericton, thence over the C. N. R. to the North Shore, which appears to be reaching out for everything in sight. If New Brunswick has anything to offer in the way of real scenic beauty it is the railway view of the noble St. John, travelled from its mouth to its source. If the noted tourists remember nothing else they will never forget this day of their journey.

Acting upon the hint of the Fredericton newspapers The Observer wrote to C. F. Crandall, managing editor of the Montreal Star and secretary to the committee having charge of the Imperial Press Conference Tour. He replied that the original plan will be adhered to and no "pull" will divert it.

The excursion will leave St. John at 7.30 a. m. on July 31 and will run by C. P. R., C. N. R. and C. P. R. to Edmundston. Four hours will be spent in Fredericton and half an hour at Woodstock. This will give the party as much of the St. John Valley in daylight as any arrangement can. There will be two trains of the finest sleeping and dining cars the railways own. They will run half an hour apart and should pass Hartland about 7 and 7.30 p. m. on Saturday, July 31.

THE HEART OF HUMANITY

Remarkable Photoplay to be Shown Here by Base Ball Club

In a little picturesque village in the Canadian woods lives Nanette, the ward of Father Michael, the parish priest. She is engaged to John, one of the five sons of Widow Patricia. John returns from college and brings with him, as traveling companion, Oscar Strang. Oscar makes love to her but Nanette never falters in her love for John.

Then comes the war. Widow Patricia gives her five sons. John and Nanette are married before he goes as an aviator in the Canadian forces. One by one the widow hears of the death of four of her boys. Nanette, a mother now, reads in her husband's letters of the terrible sufferings endured by French and Belgian children. She leaves her baby with her mother-in-law and goes abroad as a Red Cross nurse.

Nanette sees John but once. She is on duty in a convent that has been put to use as an asylum of refuge for children. Soon afterwards John's airplane is brought down inside the German lines and he is made a prisoner. In their advance toward Paris, the Germans capture the little town in which Nanette is in service. Among the enemies is Oscar Strang, now a German officer. Nanette is captured.

In the meantime, John has escaped from the German prison and goes, in German uniform, to seek Nanette in the convent. After a thrilling fight he breaks into the room where Strang and Nanette are struggling. He kills Strang and rescues his wife, but not until she had plunged a dagger into her breast.

She does not die, however. The conclusion of the story is depicted in "The Heart of Humanity," which has been described as the greatest screen production since "The Birth of a Nation," with Dorothy Phillips in the leading role.
