As she first grounded, her mast was towards the land, and the poor fellows were crowded forward to get what little shelter they could from the raging sea, that incessantly broke all over and around them; but that very temporary place of security they were uestined soon to be deprived of, for she was dashed round as upon a pivot in the reverse position, with her stern towards the shore. By 8 o'clock on Sunday morning the fore and main masts were gone, the deck and sides completely knocked away, the cargo washed out, and all the barrels stoven, and the remnant of the ship laid a helpless mass, crumbling away bit by bit before the fury of the merciless waves, which dashed with a ceaseless and relentless roar all round. The wretched crew had by this time betaken themselves to the remains of the poop, which, with the mizen mast, still stood, and it was a sad and painfully exciting sight to witness these poor creatures still clinging instinctively to life, all hope of saving which, by human means, seemed utterly to have vanished! Nevertheless, helpless as the poor fellows' case appeared, help was at hand, and thanks, under Providence, to the daring. indomitable perseverance and endurance of three poor fishermen in particular, whose names I shall Though we may not change the cottage hands who composed the crew, were safepresently record, ten out of the eleven ly brought to land. These three men are by name respectively, William Ralph Blakeburn, Joseph Moison and George Buckley; and it is by no means intended to detract from the merits of others, when all did their best manfully and with a will, or to make any invidious distinctions, that these names are specially mentioned, but to record the fact, that they were the lealers and master spirits in carrying what may well be called the forlorn hope. Ralph Blakeburn, and I believe the two others also, live in a solitary (or nearly solitary) hut at Jack Gale's Cove, at the extreme south western point of this peninsula, At a very early hour, having become aware of the disaster, these three men proceeded with a small flat amidst all the tumult of the elements, to attempt to effect a landing upon Duck Island, being the nearest or indeed only land by which the wreck could be approached. To land on Duck Island under the circumstances was a feat in itself, requiring the greatest skill, courage and activity; but they got safely to the shore and dragged their flat over the Island for nearly half a mile to a point as near to the wreck as possible, where the rescue must he effected, if to be done at all. Between this place and the wreck a rock rises its rounded head over the water's edge at low tide and calm weather; but at the present time it was but as the centre of a boiling cauldron of breakers. Fortunately the tide was ebbing and all depended upon the chance of getting a line to connect with the wreck from the rock before the tide rose again, when certain utter destruction was inevitable. It was at this juncture that the cool intrepidity of the British sailor (Raiph Blakeburn is an old man of war's man) so conspicuously displayed itsolf on the part of the three adventurers.
