OBITUARY

DANIEL MCCARTHY

The death of Daniel McCarthy one of Barnaby River's oldest and most respected citizens occurred Friday morning, after a four week's illness. The deceased was 92 years of age. He is survived by one son, Dennis, of Barnaby River, and three daughters, Mrs. M. Dawson Nelson; Mrs. J. C. Esson, Newcastle and Mary at home. The funeral was held there on Sunday afternoon, leaving his late residence at two o'clock. Services were conducted by Rev. Fr. Ebbott and interment made in the R. C. Cemetery.

ROBERT ADAMS

The death occurred at Strathadam on Sunday evening, March 1st, of Robert Adams, one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of the place. Mr. Adams was eighty-one years of age, and has been postmaster at Strathadam for about forty-five years.

He is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Jane Bule, of Newcastle two sons, Arnold and Walter of Strathadam, and three daughters, Mary, of Fredericton, Mrs. Fred Sharp, of Lower Millstream, and Mrs. Harold Jordan, of Strathadam. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon and was very largely attended. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Wm. Girdwood. Interment was at Whiteville.

VICTOR McKINLEY

OBJECT TO GOVERNMENT SCALE ON LOG

A delegation from the operators on Crown Lands on Nashwaak waters waited upon Hon. J. E. Hetherington, Minister of Lands and Mines Wednesday morning and advanced objection to the Department scale as carried out on their operations.

Some fifteen men were in the delegation and the objection in short was that the Department scale was larger than that accepted by the operators from those with whom they were doing business in the lumberwoods. Consideration was promised. It was pointed out on behalf of the Department that the scale of the Department was by a method which took account of odd lengths in logs whereas the scale which the operators accepted in their own private business took only even lengths, which made a considerable difference.

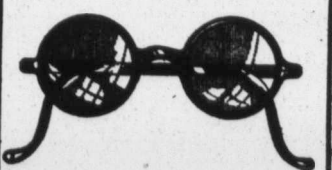
