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LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Gospel Army have resumed fire in Charlottetown.

In St. John's, British Columbia, eggs are sixty cents per dozen.

CHAPMAN'S Almanac for 1886 will be issued in good time for the new year.

His Honour Justice McTavish left for Halifax on Monday morning, to return in a few days.

The steamer Nelsie Nive arrived in Liverpool from this port on 4th inst., fourteen days out.

The Steamer Mills of Mr. Theo. J. Clark, at Summerside, was destroyed by fire last night. Loss \$7,000.

The Market yesterday was very large. This shows that the confidence of the country people is returning.

In consequence of the Cornwall Post Office being closed, our subscribers will receive their papers until further notice, at the North River Post Office.

The Summerside Pioneer says: A number of seals has been seen in the harbor the past few days. One day last week Capt. Finlayson counted no less than sixty of these animals from Rhediac to Summerside Harbor.

For the last two weeks complaints have been received from our subscribers at the Shamrock Post Office that they have not received their papers; we cannot tell how this has occurred, as they have been regularly mailed from this office.

In consequence of representations made by the authorities to His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown, the services of two additional Sisters of Charity have been secured for the Small Pox Hospital, and who are expected to arrive this evening.

Our Agents are now abroad in the Province, and we hope they will meet with hearty reception from the patrons of the HERALD. Mr. James McIsaac will collect for Queen's County and the part of Prince County east of Summerside. Mr. M. Cunningham will collect for the remaining portion of Prince County, and Mr. John D. McLean for King's County.

On Charlottetown Market Reports are wanting to-day, owing to the Market Clerk informing our reporter that he had not time to give him the information, although he applied therefor, before four o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The Market Clerk's time must be greatly taken up; we have only to say that, during Mr. Lewis's occupancy, he always found time to give the newspapers the information they required.

Last Saturday evening, a trial was made at the Electric Light Station in this city, of the Machinery, Dynamo and Lamps, by which the city will soon be illuminated. We entered the station just in time to hear a voice saying, "Let her go," in response to which the engine was put in motion, and a speed indicator applied therefor, registered 280 revolutions per minute, giving to the Armature of the Dynamo a speed of 800 revolutions per minute. The lamps, some forty in number, were supplied from temporary supports, and arranged about two feet apart in the Dynamo room. Immediately after the engine was started, sparks appeared between the carbons of the several lamps—at first a dull red spark, then a twinkle, and a few seconds later the station was flooded with light. The trial was continued for about two hours, and was pronounced most satisfactory. Another exhibition was given on Monday evening in presence of a large number of citizens, with equally satisfactory results.

We are in receipt of the "First Report of the Mission of Our Lady of the Rosary for the Protection of Immigrants." We have perused it with interest, and regret that our limited space precludes us from giving it publication in our columns. This mission at Castle Garden was urgently needed. Formerly the poor uneducated emigrants, who found themselves friendless in a large city, were an easy prey to the wicked and designing. Many an innocent young woman has been led astray through her very innocence; many a young man has been led into a career of sin and misery for want of one sincere word of direction; while others, who might have become comfortable farmers in the West, remained to die out, as imported laborers, a more wretched existence in the crowded tenement houses of New York, than that which had been their portion in the old country. Now, however, a most happy change has been effected. The Irish Catholic Colonization Society, which has done an immense amount of good in effecting the settlement of Irish emigrants on land in the West, knowing the great dangers to which emigrants are exposed, suggested the desirability of having a resident priest at Castle Garden. The late Cardinal McCloskey heartily approved of the suggestion, and appointed the Rev. John P. Riordan. He assumed his new duties with willingness, and has since worked with a zeal and energy that have won good fruit. Shortly after his appointment he visited Ireland, and successfully endeavored by tongue and pen, to stem and properly direct the tide of emigration. On his return he established a bureau in the principal western cities, and a central bureau in New York. Employment is thus found for the emigrants on their arrival, and if necessary money for travelling expenses is furnished them. He has also provided a temporary lodging house for girls, where they can safely remain while awaiting employment. Though much has been done by Father Riordan, a great part of his work has yet to be accomplished. His purpose is founding a temporary home for immigrants, and sending an Immigrant's Chapel in Castle Garden. But for all this money is required. The good priest soon found, as he aptly says, that his private purse was inadequate to the demands made upon it, and that a priest's blessing would not feed an empty stomach, or give a night's lodging to a destitute emigrant. Consequently he has established, with the cordial approval of the late Cardinal, and the approbation of Archbishop Corrigan, an institution, similar to St. Joseph's Union. Any person, on forwarding twenty-five cents to Rev. John P. Riordan, Castle Garden, New York City, can become a member, and thus share in the good work of the mission, as well as become a partner in other spiritual advantages.
