Wm. Woodman, a well and ditch digger of London, appeared before Judge Toms on Tuesday, charged with having indecently assaulted his daughter on the 22d of August last.

The prisoner, who had been putting moodily at a pipe, awaiting his Honor's arrival, stoutly denied the charge, and the general impression was that the case would fall through.

Selma Woodman, the complainant, is a girl of 24 years of age, pale, with dark eyes, auburn hair, a slight but shapely figure, and was neatly attired in a dark green, well-fitting dress. She was the only witness examined. She testified that her father entered her room, and made an improper proposal to her, but made no violent efforts to accomplish his desire.

During her cross-examination by Mr. Garrow some things very discreditable to the girl were brought out, and the case proved to be a decidedly weak one. The names of a Clinton auctioneer and a village medico were dragged into the affair in a not very flattering connection, and the family had its dirty linen washed in court to the detection of the fact that the girl had gathered to hear the case tried. Several witnesses testified to Woodman's good character.

Judge Toms referred to the fact that the prisoner had borne an excellent reputation, except that he had a weakness for liquor. The case had not been proved, as only the girl's evidence, without anything to corroborate it, had been adduced. No indecent assault had been made out, and it only remained for him to discharge the prisoner. He thought the prisoner and his wife should live separately if they could not agree better than they had done in the past.

Woodman was congratulated by a number of his friends in court on his discharge. Two of his brothers, very respectable men, were present at the trial.

LACROSSE MATCH.

A Game for the Junior Championship—Goderich Again Wins.

A very interesting game of lacrosse was played here on Friday afternoon between the junior Hurons, of Goderich, and the junior Beavers, of Seaforth, the silver cup and championship of Huron and Bruce was at stake, the Hurons having won the trophy at Lucknow from Wingham.

As is usual with lacrosse matches in Goderich, the game began about an hour after the time appointed, but some very good play on the part of the home team partly atoned for the delay. The attendance of spectators would hardly cover the expenses.

Stanley Hays was field captain for Goderich, and Happy Jack Trewlay do, for Seaforth.

W. Vanstone was the Huron umpire, while Pete Shea, a Goderich sport, watched the flag for the Beavers. J. J. Brown, referee.

The ball was faced for the first game about 4:30. For half an hour the Hurons made a determined attack upon the Beaver's flag, and the game proved decidedly one-sided from the first. The visitors' stubborn defence of their goal was the only strong play they made. The home team, on the contrary, passed the ball to one another in a way that would make some of the seniors stare, and Sharman, Jack Watson, Tom McGuire, Billy Wallace and others were repeatedly applauded for their handy play. At the expiration of half an hour George Sherman sent the rubber through the flag, amid loud cheering.

The Seaforth team then went to pieces. The second game had proceeded perhaps seven minutes when time was called, one of the visitors having received a clip on the nose. Ten seconds after the ball was faced for a renewal of the game, Jack Watson drove the sphere just where the Goderich boys wanted it.

The third game was won as quick as a flash. It was just a series of passing the ball to members of the home club, until it reached George Sherman, who passed it under the goal keeper's nose, and the game was won in less time than it takes to read this paragraph.

The junior Hurons are a tip-top team. They play a splendid game and deserve the champion title they hold.
