




When one contemplates the enormus costs of labor disputes that have ccurred during the last quarter of a entury, it is appalling. Great Britin, the leader in voluntary arbitration, has an average of from 800 t 1,000 strikes annually at a cost to the country of some forty millions of dollars. France has an average of upwards of 500. Germany annually settles about four per cent. of its

labor difficulties by arbitration, and there has been about 25,000 strikes in the United States in the last 25 years, at a cost of some five hundred millions of dollars; while during the last ten or twelve years the country I have referred to, New Zealand, ha


