Big Hotel Projected.

We are glad to learn that a forward step is being taken in the movement to establish a large hotel in our midst. It will be remembered that we devoted considerable space last October to ventilate the views of prominent citizens of St. John's on this project. Since that time a large hotel company of London have interested themselves in the movement and are willing to enter upon the project if local men will put as much money into it as the company. We learn that the Reid-Newfoundland Company are willing to invest \$50,000 cash in the stock, and also to transfer their leasehold interest in the site and foundations at Cavendish Square and also to hand over the plans and estimates they had prepared some twelve years ago. We understand that the Government are willing to grant the reversion of this leasehold interest to the Hotel Company, so that the latter would hold the fee simple interest in the property. The stimulus a large modern hotel would give to our increasing tourist traffic would be great. It is to be hoped that the project will materialize.

Memorial to Captain Cook.

It is proposed to erect a memorial in London to the memory of Captain Cook, the great navigator, and whose connection with surveys in Newfoundland is well known. Lord Brassey who was here recently in his famous yacht, Sunbeam, is one of the mittee, who are raising £3,000, and who have subscribed one-third of it among themselves. It is proposed also to erect tablets at Martonin-Cleveland, Yorks, Cook's birtheducated; and at Whitby with which he was long associated. Lord Brasscy is the treasurer of the fund.

Considers Award Very Satisfactory

There is, perhaps, no living man who knows more about the Newfoundand fisheries question recently adjudicated upon by the Hague Tribunal than does the Most Reverend Michael howley, Archbishop of St. John's, ewfoundland.

His Grace is at present at Montreal attending the Eucharistic Congress, and is a guest at St. Patrick's Presbytery. The distinguished prelate has but recently returned from The Hague where he heard the case presented for Great Britain and the United States by the great jurists representing the two arbitrating powers.

ing the two arbitrating powers.

It is a well known fact that Archbishop Howley played a very prominent part in the preparation of Newfoundland's case although His Grace with characteristics. with characteristic modesty gives all credit for the splendid manner the ancient Colony's side was drawn up by the Hon. J. M. Kent, K. C., the late Minister of Justice in Sir Robert ond's Cabinet.

"Speaking generally-and I am ompelled to speak so, not having had the opportunity of studying the several phases of the award closely—I may say that the decision is, or should be, satisfactory to Newfoundland and Great Britain. The Hague tribunal has sustained our contentions in a manner quite acceptable to us and it only remains for our government in the colony to exercise the rights the award gives us to greatly promote the best interests of the people of the Island. Whether this will be done or not, I cannot say. I am sorry to con-fess that political exigency has played 00 prominent a part in the affair of Newfoundland in the past.
