"The surplus was utilized for the time being to pay outstanding bills of \$60,000 for telegraph extension, \$36,-000 for improvements to General Hospital, \$3,000 for addition to General Post Office, \$18,000 on account of public buildings at Grand Falls Freshwater, Bay Roberts and Span lard's Bay. These amounts, however, have been included in the Loan Bill, in which authority is now being asked, and when it is passed and the money raised, the surplus trust will be reimbursed for the money and the surplus of last year will be used to pay-The cost of General Election-\$51,000; Education Augmentation Grant, 10,000, and Road Outlays, \$55,-

In other words by the flotation of the loan and the transfers, the Government intends to relieve the present year's revenue of a charge of \$116,000 which would have gone to swell the deficit next June, 30th. This would have given a deficit of \$266,000. #### Durango's Trying Trip.

Anxiety about the Furness Line Durango, Chambers, nineteεn days out from Liverpool to this port, was dispelled this morning when the news reached the city that the steam er passed Cape Race at 8 o'clock this morning. The Durango must have had an exceptionally rough experi-ence and trying trip, as under ordinary conditions she makes the trip from the Old Country in less than half the time she took on this occakept too far north, encountered field ice and got jammed. At 1 p.m. to-day the Durango was signalled from Cabot Tower, but the ship had to al-ter her course and keep well south
