**Germany And Holland**

Holland will be very keenly interested in the speech by the King of Bavaria which is reported to-day. What precisely did he mean when he said that "now, at last we may hope to get more favorable communications with the sea for Central and South Germany?" He might mean only that the annexation of Belgium would give Germany a new seaboard and, in particular, the possession of Antwerp. But the report of his speech must be defective, for a Munich paper says that he "spoke with certainty of the direct outlet we shall gain from the Rhine to the sea." The mouths of the Rhine being in Dutch territory, it would seem as though the King of Bavaria was already contemplating the annexation of Belgium, and we recall how on August 4 last year Herr von Jagow the German Foreign Secretary, said that "it is obvious that we could not profitably annex Belgian territory without making at the same time territorial acquisitions at the expense of Holland." The Dutch paper, however, goes on to say that the extension of German influence to the mouth of the Rhine is to be "economic" in character. The least, then, that we are to take Germany as contemplating is the annexation of Belgium and the compulsion of Holland into some form of Customs union, with Herr von Jagow's threat of "territorial acquisitions" held over her. How long would Germany, having swallowed Belgium, be content to leave Holland in possession of the mouth of the Rhine, the Meuse, and the Scheldt, all three of which she would declare to be "German" rivers? —Ex.

**Airman Falls to Death.**

Major Lumsden of the Flying Corps Fatally Wounded. London, June 21.—Major Lumsden, of the Royal Army Flying Corps, was killed this afternoon while flying over the Brooklands aviation course. Major Harry T. Lumsden was making a flight as a passenger on a trial trip. The aeroplane had reached an altitude of 200 feet when the engine went wrong and the machine dived earthwards and was smashed. Major Lumsden was so badly injured that he died in a few hours, but the injuries of the pilot were not serious.
