With his death the last obstacle to German ambition has fallen, for the new Emperor is a young, pleasure-loving man, without character and experience. He has been educated by German as well as Czech proifessors, and spent most of his life in Bohemia, staying in the Royal palace at Prague and with his dragoon regiment in Brandeis, near Prague. But, like his uncle, he gained few sympathisers among the Czech people.
