GENERAL MOTORS.

August Sales Reflect Improvement in Automobile Industry.

N.Y.—Steady improvement in automobile conditions is indicated by General Motors report of sales for August. Its figures furnish an accurate index of the trend in the industry, as they include not only factory sales to dealers but retail sales to the public. Furthermore, General Motors produces about 20% of motor vehicles of the country in low, medium and high priced fields, and the report is therefore fairly representative of the whole trade.

In furnishing these comprehensive figures General Motors Corporation is performing a valuable service and establishing a precedent which many other companies will sooner or later be inclined to follow. Much of the misapprehension concerning conditions in the industry has arisen from unwillingness of leading producers to publish figures accurately showing the position of both factory and retailer.

Effect of this policy was evident early this year when the record output was given wide publicity by many manufacturers, although retail sales were showing no inclination to expand beyond the high totals of the previous year.

Sales of General Motors to its dealers of 48,450 units in August were 46% greater than the low of 32,984 in June this year and 61% of the peak sales of 78,668 in February. Notwithstanding the increase in sales to dealers the past two months the total was below the number delivered to the consumer, indicating the process of liquidating the heavy carry-over was still in progress. The extent to which dealers' stocks have been liquidated is shown by a comparison of figures for the past 10 months. With steadily rising demand from dealers recently, while retail deliveries were showing seasonal recession, the conclusion is that stocks of cars are now at the low point.

In five months beginning Nov. 1, tail deliveries were 128,000 greater than sales by the factory. During the period the public received 354,866 vehicles, while the various General Motors divisions sold to dealers only 226,562.

In five months beginning No. 1, 1923, the situation was reversed and whereas dealers delivered only 221,840 cars to the public, they bought from the factory 343,274, of which more than 120,000 were placed in stock and represented the approximate surplus sold the past five months.

August deliveries to the public of 54,149 cars were only slightly lower than 55,832 in August last year. On this showing, and with definite signs of business improvement the latter part of this year, executives believe public purchases the current four months will closely approximate the closing months of 1923. In the last four months of 1923 retail deliveries of General Motors vehicles averaged 50,000 monthly, against 43,000 monthly in corresponding period of 1922. Sales to dealers during these periods averaged 70,000 and 43,000, respectively.

As officials have said the corporation would not in future attempt to stock its dealers and that factory output would be kept closely in line with the retail sales curve, the prospect is that General Motors for the balance of the year will be able to maintain its sales to dealers at 50,000 to 55,000 cars monthly. This would bring total sales for the corporation in the current year to around 650,000 vehicles, against 795,000 in 1923 and 457,000 in 1922.

MAXWELL MOTOR CORPORATION. Limiting Current Month's Production To Previous Month's Sales To Public.

NEW YORK.—Pres. Chrysler of Maxwell Motor Corporation has inaugurated a new policy to avoid overproduction.

"Though the retail demand for new Chrysler cars is ahead of present output," Mr. Chrysler said, "our policy is to limit current month's production to previous month's actual sales

to the public. This means that the Chrysler and Maxwell organization will avoid the embarrassment of overproduction and overstocking dealers. We are now on a well-balanced basis, and as sales increase, are in a position to expand plant operations.

"Under this plan of operation, Chrysler and Maxwell inventories are kept in liquid shape, and forward commitments are restricted to actual requirements."

Chrysler and Maxwell now total about 2,900, compared with 1,696 a year ago and 1,221 two years ago.

Portia Arrives From Westward

BRINGS ENCOURAGING FISHERY REPORTS.

S.S. Portia, Capt. Connors, arrived from the westward yesterday afternoon, and sails again this evening to take up the regular route. Capt. Connors brings very encouraging reports of the fishery in Fortune and St. Mary's Bay. During the past month the boats operating in these parts have done well; in fact some of the schooners have lettered their catch of twenty years ago. There is plenty of squid and herring for bait. It has been a very successful bank fishery as well. Buyers along the coast are now paying \$8.50 per quintal for No. 1 fish.
