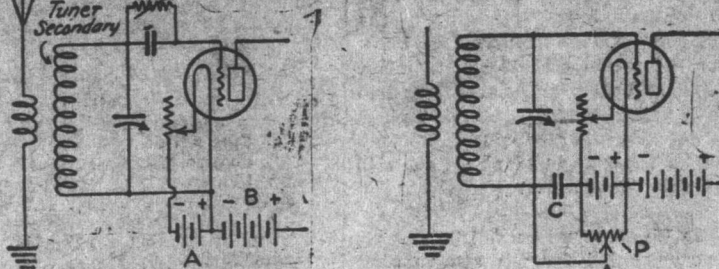

Grid Condenser and Leak Not Necessary for Detection

The use of a grid condenser and grid leak for the detector circuit is so common to-day that most people are unaware of the fact that another method is possible which does not involve either the condenser or leak. This is the "grid bias" method, and to make use of it you will need a 200-400-ohm potentiometer.

In Fig. 1 is shown the grid condenser and leak method of detection. The standardized value for the grid condenser is .00025 mfd. The grid leak can be a fixed value between 1/2 and 10 megohms, but it is a much better plan to put in a good variable leak with a range of from approximately one-half to five megohms, as different tubes will need different values of resistance, and often the same tube will necessitate varying values to suit the immediate operating conditions.

One of the odd things about detection by grid condenser and leak is that so far radio theorists have not been able to agree on the way in which detection is effected. Several
