

NEWSPAPER PUBLICITY LAW UPHOLD BY THE SUPREME COURT

Publications of States Must
File Semi-Annual Statement
Showing Responsibility

Washington, June 12.—The validity of the "newspaper publicity law," enacted in 1912 as a provision of the postal appropriation act, was upheld today by the supreme court of the United States. Chief Justice White announced the court's decision.

This law requires every newspaper, magazine or other publication to file semi-annually with the postmaster general and the local postmaster a sworn statement of the names of the editors, managers, owners, stockholders and bondholders, and in the case of daily newspapers, the average daily circulation. Publication of these statements is required and for failure to comply with any of the provisions of the law, the publication shall be denied the privileges of the mail.

A second paragraph provides that paid-for editorial or advertising matter of any "such" publication shall be marked "advertisement," under penalty of a fine or imprisonment.

Comply Under Protest.

About 86 per cent of the newspapers already have complied with the law, many under protest. The Lewis Publishing company and The Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin of New York led the attack upon the statute, bringing suits for injunction in the federal district court of southern New York, and when the law was upheld there, appealing to the highest court. They claimed that the law sought to "regulate journalism" and to enforce a "censorship of the press."

In reply, former Solicitor General Bullitt contended that notwithstanding a division of the provision into two typographical paragraphs by the senate after the measure was passed by the house, the law was only one paragraph, imposing conditions in both upon the use of the low second-class rates accorded newspapers and magazines.

Adopt Bullitt Interpretation.

The supreme court today adopted Mr. Bullitt's interpretation. The use in the act of the word "entered" a technical word, employed only as to second-class mail matter, showed, Chief Justice White held, that congress in passing the law had in mind only the second-class mail and not the right to use the mail as a whole. The use of the words "privileges of the mail," the chief justice took to be a positive reference to the second-class of mail because of the great advantages newspapers were granted under the second-class rates over other classes of the mail in order to promote the "dissemination of current intelligence."

He said congress did not intend to exclude papers not complying with the provisions from the use of the mail, but to "regulate journalism" and to enforce an administrative reason only.

The legislative history of the provision, the chief justice declared, upheld the interpretation of the words "given by the court."

Why Congress Has Right.

After interpreting the provision imposing conditions on the use of the second-class mail, the chief justice proceeded to discuss why congress had the right to impose such conditions.

A study of postal laws from colonial days to the present, he said, showed a persistent adherence to a policy of discrimination in favor of newspapers in the mails. He quoted Mr. Bullitt as stating that letter mail was subjected to a charge 40 times higher than that for newspapers, and that letter mail produced an additional profit of \$10,000,000, while the newspaper class entailed a \$70,000,000 annual loss upon the government. As a further discrimination, he said, individuals must pay a higher rate for mailing newspapers than the publishers.

Rules Promulgated Since 1887.

In return for this discrimination, the chief justice declared, congress had the right to fix the standard to be met by those who wished to enjoy the privileges. As far back as 1887 rules were promulgated for those desiring to enjoy the privilege of the cheap rates.

He suggested that he could not bring his mind to the conclusion that newspaper attorneys were assailing a classification of mails, with certain conditions attached to situations, which had been made in the press regarding the press, when for a long series of years legislation had specifically favored the press to its pecuniary benefit by classification. The conclusion reached was that he could not find the law affecting more than 25,000 publications in the United States.

H. J. HURD, LEADER OF LABOR UNION, HURT IN FIGHT

Alleges Manager of Cafe
Stabbed Him During
the Struggle

Claiming that he had been seriously stabbed by a waiter at the Maple Leaf cafe, Hurd, leader of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, local No. 410, lodged a complaint against Andrew Demis, manager of the cafe, last night, and caused the man's arrest.

This trouble occurred after a fight over a charge of overcharge on the part of Demis, a sturdy young fellow, threw Hurd through the window, and in the fight Hurd claimed that he had been stabbed. Demis, on the other hand, alleged that the cut had been inflicted while Hurd went through the glass-ware.

Policeman Woodley served the warrant, and Demis was locked up, but had \$141 in his possession when arrested. Later in the evening he was bailed out by Peter Morris, owner of the cafe, \$500 cash bail being deposited. He will be taken before Magistrate Sanders this morning.
